# I. Motivations

- Journal Access Programs  
AGORA, eIFL, HINARI, PERI, TEEAL
- Countries

## Journal Access Programs

- Negotiates reduced cost or free access to journal content for developing countries.
- Delivers content to institutions in countries via CD-ROM, DVD, hard drive, on-line.



- AGORA: set up by Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN. Provides access to 913 journals to institutions in 69 countries.
- eIFL: set up by The Open Society Institute. “[eIFL's] focus is on negotiating affordable subscriptions on a multi-country consortial basis”
- HINARI: set up by WHO, access to collections of biomedical and health literature, over 3421 journal titles, serves 113 countries
- PERI: negotiates affordable, sustainable access licenses to over 17,000 journals
- TEEAL: Provides access to 115 journals in the field of agriculture on CD-ROM or hard drive.

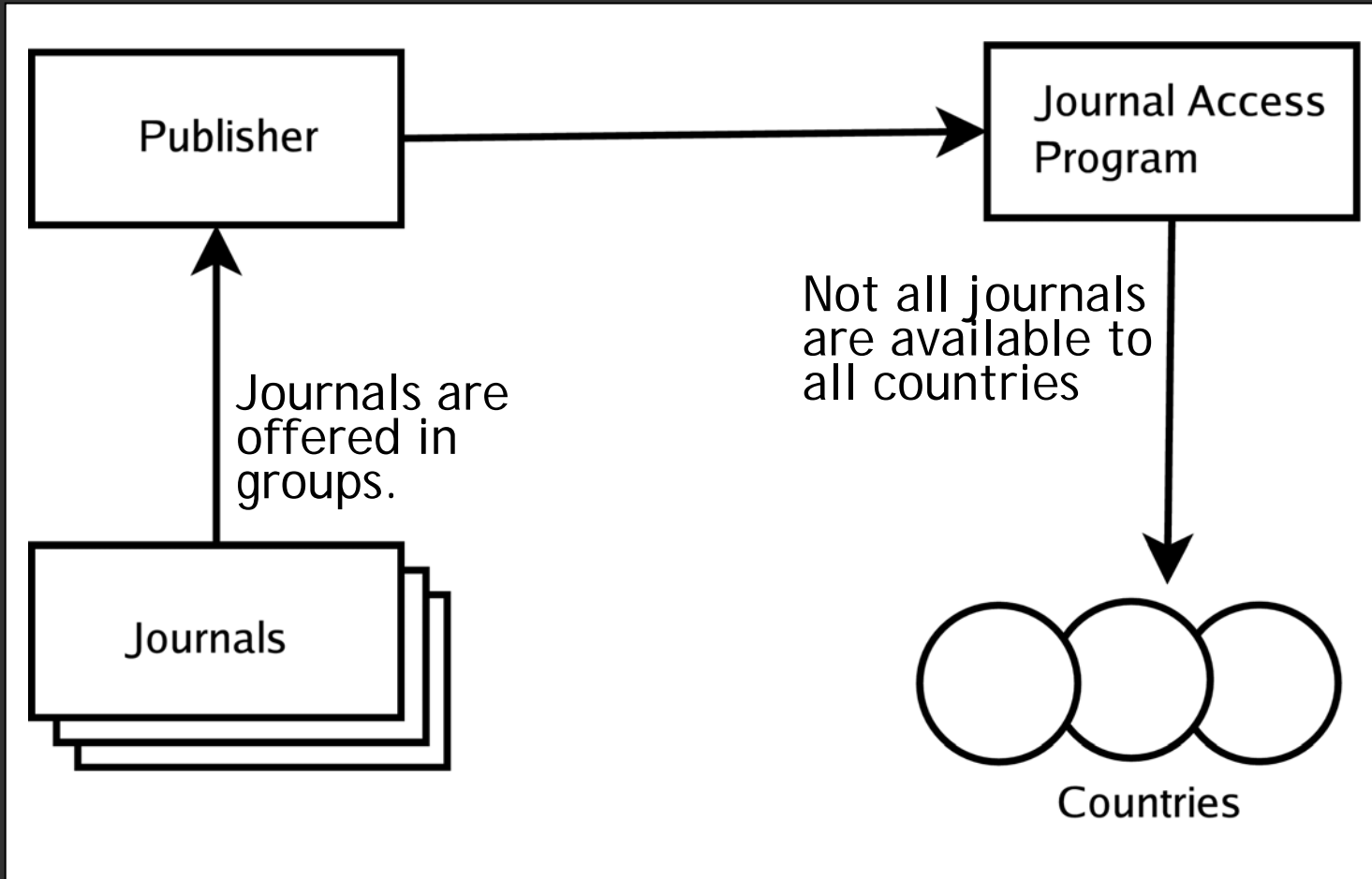

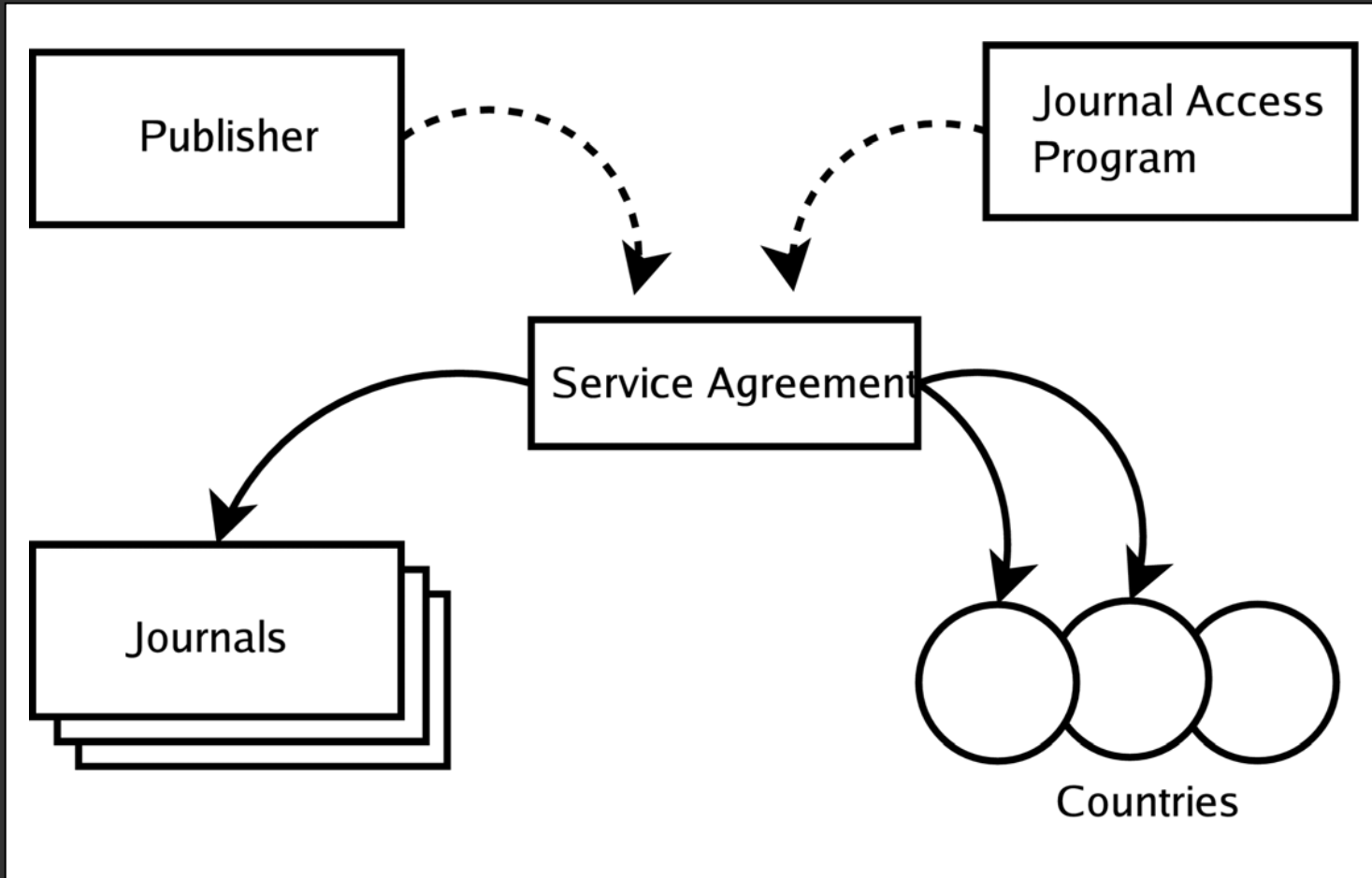

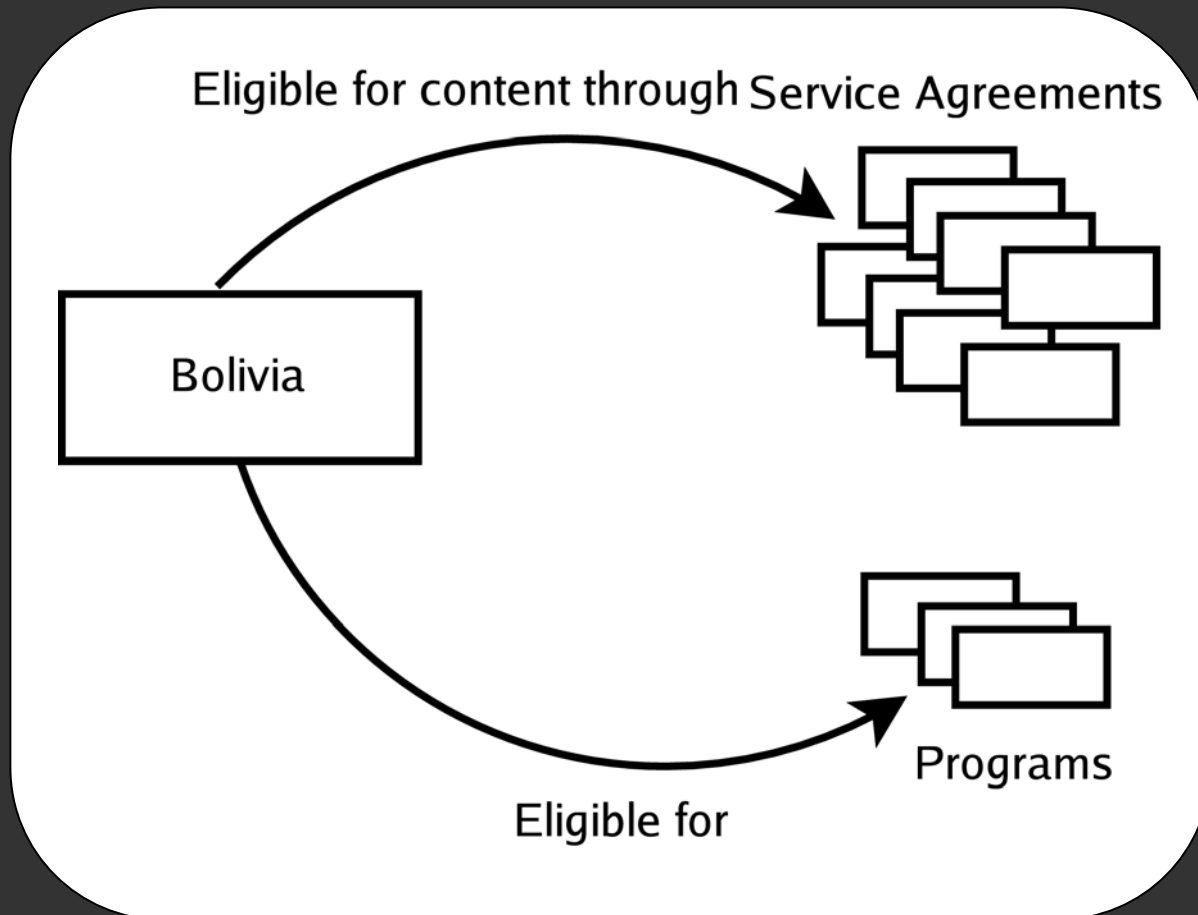

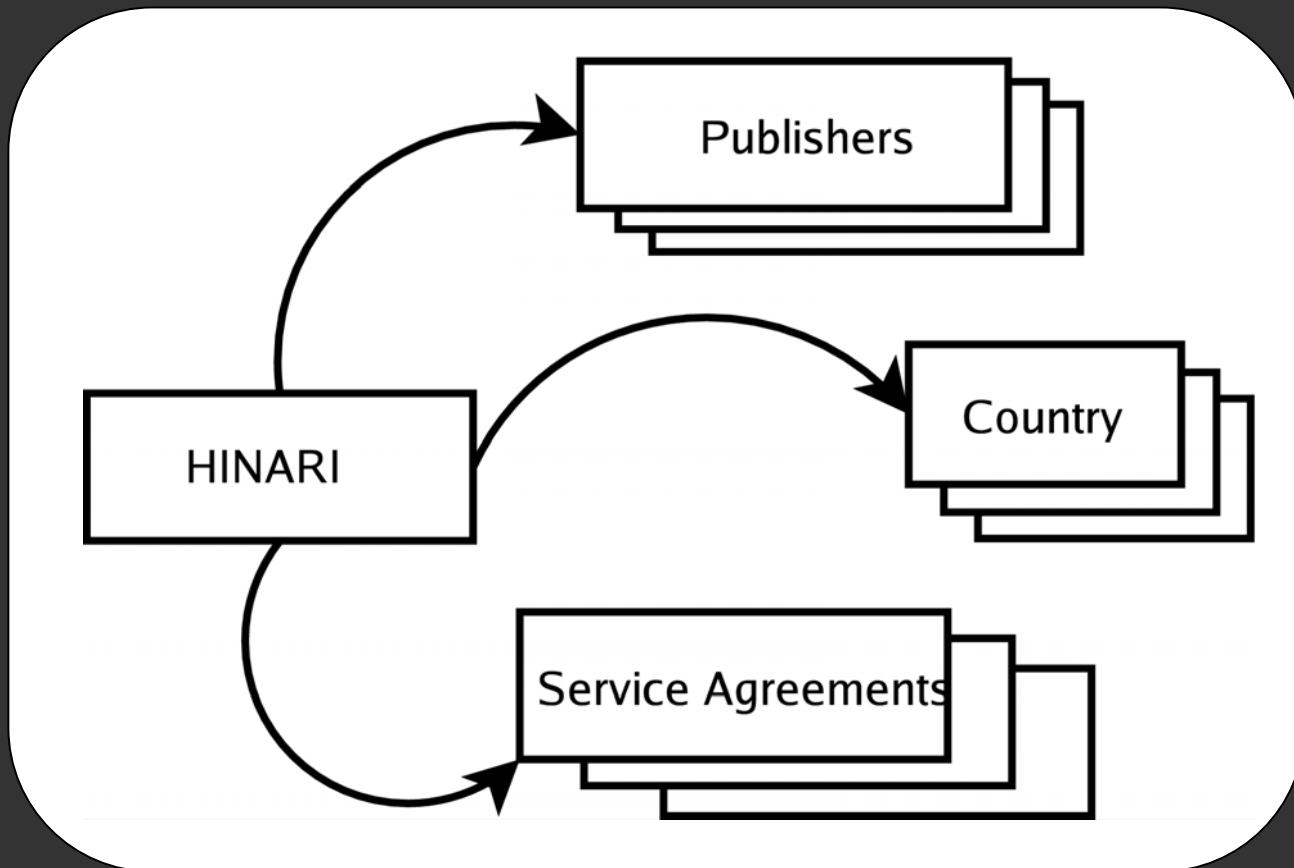


# View from a country



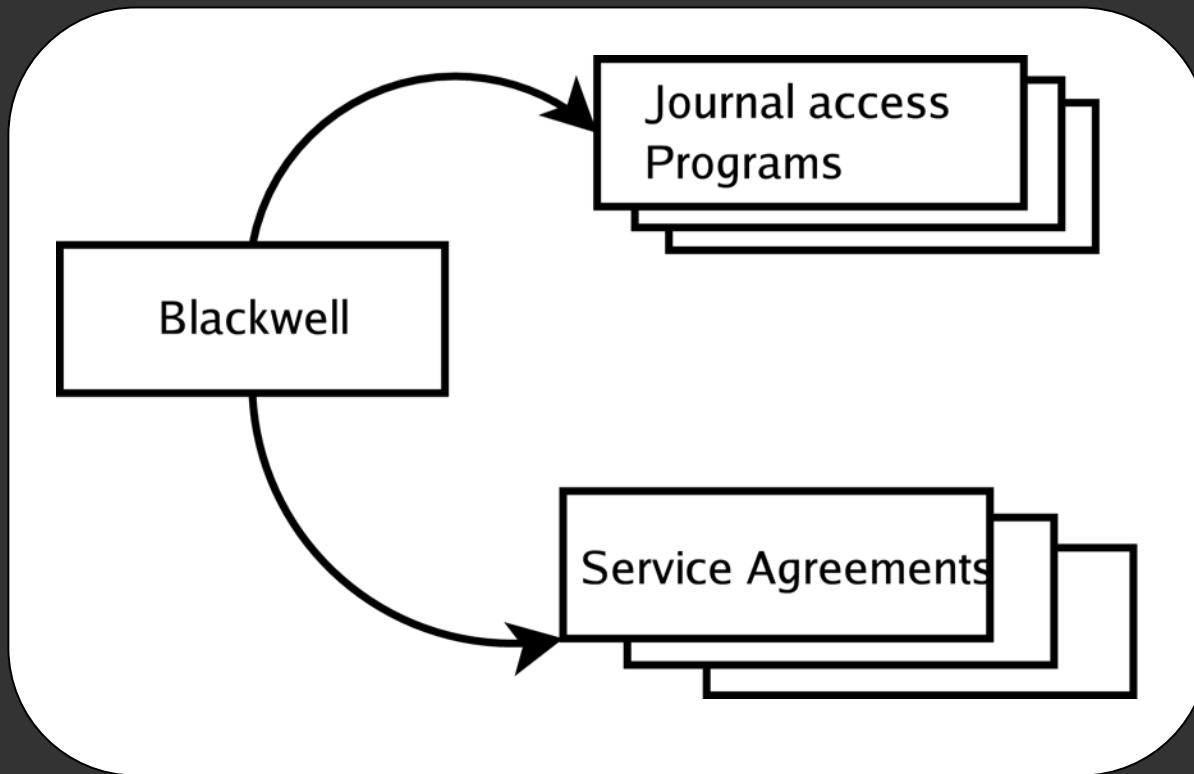


# View from a Program
