FINANCE COMMITTEE.

July 17th, 1916,

By the written or verbal consent of all members of the Committee, the Comptroller was authorized to purchase for the University, \$25,000 of the American Foreign Securities Company 5% secured gold notes due August 1st, 1919.

BUILDING COMMITTEE OF CORNELL UNIVERSITY.

Resolved, That this committee recommend to the State Architect the awarding of contracts, under proposals recently received, to the low bidders as follows:

1. John W. Danforth Company of Buffalo, N. Y., to furnish all labor and materials for heating work, new underground conduits, steam connections, etc., as shown on the drawings and specifications

(Specifications 2395, including Addenda No. I) New York State College of Agriculture, for the sum of \$23,841.00.

- 2. To W. D. McElwee of Ithaca, N. V., to furnish all labor and materials as shown on drawings and as specified for the construction work of a sheep barn for the sum of \$2,544.00.
- 3. To Lord & Burnham Company, New York City, to furnish all labor and materials as shown on the drawings and as specified for the construction work, including the labor and materials for heating work and for plumbing work, for one new greenhouse known as the Palm and Decorative Plant House, for the sum of \$3,563.00.
- 4. To the Davis, Brown Electric Co. of Ithaca, N. Y., to furnish all labor and material as shown on drawings and as specified for the electric work for one new greenhouse known as the Palm and Decorative Plant House, for the sum of \$98.50.
- 5. To W. D. McElwee of Ithaca, N. Y., to furnish all labor and materials in accordance with plans and specifications for construction work of cattle barn at New York State Veterinary College, for the sum of \$6,660.00.
- 6. To the Williams Electric Company of Ithaca, N. Y., for all labor and material as per plans and specifications for electric work in cattle barn, New York State Veterinary College for the sum of \$189 oo.
- 7. To C. J. Rumsey & Company, Ithaca, N. Y., for furnishing the finishing hardware, as per plans and specifications, for the Drill Hall at Cornell University, for the sum of \$989.58.

Regrets were received from Trustees Westinghouse, Pound and Hiscock and their absence excused.

Action was taken as follows:

I. The following report was presented and adopted.

Your Committee to which a communication from Dr. Kerr in regard to a plan for distribution of the yearly appropriation for the Sage

Research Fund, was referred, presents the following recommendations.

First: That the yearly appropriation from the Sage Research Fund of the Medical College be administered by a Committee composed of the President of the University and the heads of the departments that will participate in the fund.

Second: That a minimum sum be assigned by this Committee each year to each department.

Third: That the remainder and any unexpended portion of the minimum appropriation to the several departments be reserved to be allotted upon application for a specific research.

Fourth: That any unexpended balance be allowed to accumulate and may be assigned by the Committee at any time when a department shall show that there are specific needs for some special research.

Fifth: That each participant shall make an annual report of the research carried on by it and of the expenses incidental thereto.

By action of the Board of Trustees an appropriation of \$1,500 is available for this purpose for the year 1916-17.

- 2. Resolved, That the hour for the meeting of the full Board on November 11th, 1916, be set for 10 A. M.
- 3. Resolved, That the Administration Committee hold its November meeting on Saturday, November 11th, at 9 A M. immediately preceding the meeting of the full Board.
- 4. The President reported that by authority vested in him by the Board of Trustees he had appointed Professor A. R. Mann Acting Dean of the College of Agriculture at a salary of \$6,000 per annum.
- 5. The President reported the resignation of C. F. Hirshfeld, Professor of Power Engineering.
- 6. The President presented a communication from Dr. William Gilman Thompson, Professor of Medicine in the Medical College in New York City, resigning his professorship in the College, with a view to relieving himself of the heavy demands made upon him by his College and Hospital duties, so that he might devote himself to his practice without interference from his other duties, and the resignation was accepted, to take effect, as has been previously arranged by President Schurman, with Dr. Thompson, at the beginning of the present college year, i. e., September 27th, 1916; whereupon it was

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees place upon record an expression of their genuine regret that Dr. Thompson finds himself compelled to withdraw from the Medical College, of whose faculty he has been a member from the beginning, and an assurance of the appreciation in which they have held his services as a teacher, a sci-

entific investigator, and the managing head of one of the largest departments of the College; and they also desire to convey to Dr. Thompson in addition to this expression of admiration and gratitude for his past services their best wishes for his happiness and prosperity in the unrestricted practice of the profession of which he has been for so many years a distinguished ornament and leader.

7. To fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Thompson, it was

Resolved, That Lewis Atterbury Conner, now Professor of Clinical Medicine be recommended to the full Board for election as Professor of Medicine at a salary of \$4,000 per annum, effective at the beginning of the academic year, 1916-17.

- 8. Resolved, That the leave of absence granted to Professor H. H. Love for one year, beginning October 1, 1916, be postponed for one year
- 9. Leave of absence for the year 1916-17, or so much thereof as may be necessary, without salary was granted to Professor Mauxion and Professor Guerlac.
- 10. Resolved, That Dr. Edith H. Matzke, without any change in her appointment as Medical Adviser of Women Students, be appointed Acting Adviser of Women for a period from October 7, 1916, to September 15th, 1917. That for this service she receive extra compensation of \$1,000 and that the remaining \$1,000 of salary appropriated in the Budget for this advisership, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be used for the payment of a medical assistant to Dr. Matzke for one year.

- 18. The administration of the income of the Edwin G. Vail Fund was referred to the Committee on the Guiteau Loan Fund.
- 19. A communication from Dean Creighton in regard to tuition of graduate students was referred for investigation and report to the Committee appointed at the June meeting of the Board on the establishment of tuition scholarships for graduate students.

- 20. A communication from Dr. Kerr, Secretary of the Ithaca Division of the Medical College, in regard to additional tables in the Biochemical laboratory and the matter of additional equipment in the Department of Zoology was referred to the Comptroller and Chairman of the Finance Committee with power.
- 21. Whereas, a check from the Treasurer of the United States payable to the Treasurer of the State of New York for \$50,000 for Congressional Industrial Fund has apparently been lost in the mail.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the State of New York be requested to procure a bond, as required by the Government, for the issuing of a duplicate check, and that the University Treasurer be authorized to pay the expense of same.

22. Whereas the Federal Government requires a surety bond to secure the return to it of government property loaned the University for use of the Military Department, and

Whereas Trustees Roger B. Williams and Mynderse Van Cleef are willing to act as sureties on said bond, therefore be it

Resolved, That President J. G. Schurman be authorized to execute on behalf of the University the bond of the University to the Government as above required in the penal sum of \$120,000 and to affix to the said bond the corporate seal of the University, and be it further

Resolved, That in consideration of the execution of said bond by said Roger B. Williams and Mynderse Van Cleef, the University shall and hereby does agree to indemnify and hold them harmless from any loss by reason thereof.

- 23. The Comptroller was authorized to return to the Matthews Construction Company under such conditions as the University Attorney may direct, the surety bond given to secure the performance of the contracts for the erection of Baker Court and Founders Hall.
- 24. Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to consent to the investment of the proceeds of the residuary estate of Mrs. Bernice Haviland Guernsey in a paid up life insurance policy in the Penn Mutual Life Insurance Company, covering the life of the holder of the life estate, if such action is agreed to by all parties concerned.
- 25. Resolved, That the action providing that each undergraduate student registered in the University be charged a locker fee of \$2 per term which locker fee shall cover the use of a locker in the University gymnasiums, or in the State Drill Hall, or in the Schoellkopf Memorial Building, with the use of bathing facilities and towels therein and the use of the Cornell University gymnasiums and playgrounds, except that, until better facilities are provided, the fee shall not be collected from women students, be suspended for the year 1916-17, except as to Freshmen and Sophomores in the University,

and that members of the Freshmen and Sophomore classes be required to pay the fee.

- 26. The Comptroller was authorized to make a request of the Legislature for an appropriation of \$10,000 for the Maintenance of the New York State Drill Hall for the year 1917-18, and \$15,410 for equipment.
- 27. The President was given authority to confer degrees this Fall as recommended by the special faculties.
- 28. Miss M. C. Little, superintendent of dining rooms was permitted to register for part work each term in the College of Arts, without payment of tuition.
- 29. The Treasurer reported the receipt, from Mr. C. H. Baker, Founder of the Fuertes Memorial Prize, of ten (10) shares of American Cyanamid Company preferred stock, to be added to the fund and it was,

Resolved, That the gift be accepted and the Secretary transmit to Mr. Baker the thanks of the Trustees for his generosity.

November 10, 1916.

- I. A Committee of which Professor Dennis was chairman appeared, to present to the committee, the request of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity in regard to rebuilding its fraternity house on the campus. Professor Willcox also addressed the committee in regard to the application of the University Club.
- 2. The minutes of the meetings of this committee of September 23, 1916, and October 16, 1916, were approved as printed.
- 3. The action of the sub-committee on the Drill Hall in authorizing on September 12th, certain changes in partitions in the basement of the Drill Hall, was approved.
- 4. Resolved, That the recommendations of the sub-committee on the Drill Hall floor be accepted and the State Architect be notified that a modification in the plans is authorized by changing an area approximately 182 x 326 feet as shown by blue print submitted (S-1020 A Sheet No. 1, Scheme No. 3) by the sub-committee, from concrete to wood, provided arrangements can be concluded by which the saving made by the omission of concrete over such area, which in the opinion of the sub-committee on Drill Hall, be fair and sufficient, shall be available for use in connection with any funds that may be otherwise obtained, for the construction of a wooden floor over such area.
- 5. Resolved, That the proposition of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity for a lease extending beyond the term of the present lease be declined.
- 6. Resolved, That permission be given to the Psi Upsilon Fraternity to erect a new and fire-proof fraternity house in the place of the present one, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees as to its form and character and subject to such modifications, if any, as may be subsequently determined upon, with respect to the provisions of the lease of that fraternity as to the valuation of such building when acquired by the University, and that a committee be appointed by the Chairman to confer with representatives of the fraternity in respect thereto. The chair appointed Trustees Sackett and J. Du Pratt White.
- 7. Resolved, That this committee approves of the recommendations of the sub-committee that no claim be made of the Seneca Engineering Co., Contractor for structural steel for damage by reason of the delay already had in the erection of the Drill Hall.

- 8. A communication from Trustee C. E. Treman in regard to temporary decorations in the new Drill Hall and the question of provision for such decorations as may be thought wise, was referred to the sub-committee upon Drill Hall.
- 9. Resolved, That this committee approves the proposed additions to the Stock Judging Pavilion and the Forestry Building, within the appropriation available upon plans to be approved by the State Architect and the Chairman of this committee.
- 10. Resolved, That the Department of Landscape Art of the College of Agriculture, be given permission to develop the University grounds within the following area: Within the east line of the Reservoir lot, the Forest Home Road, the Judd Falls Road and the Buildings of the College of Agriculture except those portions now being used for other purposes, the plans to be subject to the approval of this committee, the planting in the area to be also used for illustrative purposes.

The designation of such area, however, is not to be regarded as permanent; but such area is to remain open to any other use that may subsequently be found by the Board of Trustees to be wise or expedient.

- 11. The matter of room in the Residential Halls for women, for use of the Women's Review and the Bulletin for the present year, was referred to the Adviser of women, with power, and she was informed that no room in either of the women's halls would be available for that purpose after the present college year.
- 12. An application of the Cornell Dramatic Club for permission to fit and use room B in Goldwin Smith Hallfor the presentation of plays and for use of the storage rooms in connection with the stage, was referred to the Superintendent with power.

- 2. Since Professor E. L. Nichols is to take charge of research work in Rockefeller Hall during the summer of 1917, it was *resolved* that he be relieved from residence during the first six weeks of the 2nd term of the current year.
- 3. Whereas, under the rules of the Carnegie Foundation, professors are eligible for pensions only after 15 years of service as professor or assistant professor, and

WHEREAS, Professor J. L. Stone will not have satisfied this requirement until the fall of 1918:

Resolved, That the rule terminating the appointment of professors in this University at 65 years of age shall be suspended in the case of Professor Stone and that the term of his professorship shall not expire until the fall of 1918.

- 2. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on General Administration June 20, 1916, and October 7, 1916, as printed, and the minutes of the meeting of November 11, 1916, as read were approved and the action therein contained, ratified and confirmed.

- 3. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds from June 19, 1916, to October 16, 1916, as printed, and of the meeting of November 10, 1916, as read were approved and the action therein contained, ratified and confirmed, and appropriations made as therein recommended.
- 4. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Finance from June 15, 1916, to October 3, 1916, inclusive were approved as printed and the action therein contained, ratified and confirmed.
- 5. Representatives of the unions of the masons and carpenters of the city appeared before the Board and addressed it upon the proposition that the University employ only union masons and carpenters, and it was voted that the policy of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds in this matter be approved.
- 6. The report of the President for the year ending June 30, 1916, was received and placed on file.
- 7. The report of the Comptroller for the year ending June 30, 1916, was received and placed on file.
- 8. The time of the winter meeting of the Board of Trustees was fixed for January 6, 1917, at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City at 9 A. M., with the understanding that the morning session will adjourn at not later than 12:30.

18. The President presented the resignation of G. S. Moler, Professor of Physics (he having reached the retiring age), effective at Commencement, 1917; whereupon it was

Resolved, That the Trustees in accepting the resignation of Professor Moler desire to express their high appreciation of his faithful and devoted service to the University in the Department of Physics for over forty years. As a teacher he is held in affectionate and grateful remembrance by many generations of university students. For twelve years he shared with Professor Anthony the entire work of the department and during that period in collaboration with him, designed, constructed and installed the first dynamo in America, the

first arc-lighting system (that on the campus of Cornell University), and the first apparatus for the electrolytic production on a considerable scale of oxygen and hydrogen. He has also devised countless original and ingenious pieces of apparatus of incalculable value to the Department of Physics. And the photographic laboratory in Rockefeller Hall, with its original and unique equipment, is largely of his planning.

Further Resolved, That President Schurman be directed to apply to the Carnegie Foundation for a retiring allowance for Professor Moler.

19. By ballots duly had the following were elected:

Lewis Atterbury Conner to be Professor of Medicine in the Cornell University Medical College in New York City for the year 1916-17 at a salary of \$4,000.

C. P. Fitch to be Professor of Bacteriology in the New York State Veterinary College for the academic year 1916-17 at a salary of \$2,750. George R. Harrison to be Professor of Military Science and Tactics during the term of his detail at a salary of \$200 per annum.

20. Chairman Hiscock presented the report of the Committee upon the revision of the university statutes, and it was

Resolved, That the proposed statutes and rules and regulations as submitted be adopted subject to the right of all members of the Board to submit any proposed additions or changes at the January meeting of this Board. Copies of such proposed changes or additions to be filed with Chairman Hiscock on or before December 1, 1916, and provided that at the January, 1917, meeting of the Board amendments to the statutes may be made by a majority vote of those present. Carried unamiously.

21. Trustee Sacket as chairman of the Committee on Semi-Centennial Celebration presented the recommendation of its Executive Committee on the favorable report of its sub-committee on Pageantry, Masque and Spectacles, that some form of Pageantry shall form a part of the proposed celebration, and that such sub-committee be authorized in preparing their preliminary plans to advise with an experienced Director of Pageants at an expense of not to exceed \$50.

Chairman Sackett also reported that the sub-committee on the Ezra Cornell Statue were making gratifying progress in the designing of the statue and its pedestal by the sculptor, and that probably the final form would be reported for approval at the next meeting of the Board.

22. Upon the recommendation of Chairman Sackett, the Dean of the College of Agriculture Ex-Officio was appointed a member of the General Committee on Semi-Centennial Celebration to succeed Dean Galloway.

- 23. At the request of the Executive Committee of the Cornellian Council \$1,168.96 was added to the amount authorized for the Council for expenses for the year 1915–16, and \$2,500 was added to the budget of the Council for the fiscal year 1916–17.
- 24. Resolved, That a committee consisting of Trustees Edwards, Pound, Willcox, C. E. Treman, Ickelheimer and Boldt be appointed to consider the matter of increasing the tuition to be charged in the several courses in the university, and to report at the January meeting of this Board, and that copies of their report be sent to the members of the Board at least one week prior to the meeting.
- 25. Whereas, By action of the Committee on General Administration at its meeting October 7, 1916, the Treasurer of the State of New York was requested to procure a bond as required by the Government for the issuing of a duplicate check payable to the Treasurer of the State of New York for \$50,000 for the Congressional Industrial Fund to replace one apparently lost in the mail, and the University Treasurer was authorized to pay the expense of same, and it appearing that the cost of said bond issued by a surety company would be \$1.000 and

WHEREAS, Trustees Roger B. Williams and Mynderse VanCleef are willing to become sureties on such a bond now be it

Resolved, That in consideration of the execution of said bond by said Roger B. Williams and Mynderse VanCleef, the University shall and hereby does agree to indemnify and hold them and each of them harmless from any loss by reason thereof. And it was further

Resolved, That the Board extend to Trustees Williams and Van Cleef its thanks and appreciation of their action in the matter.

- 26. Trustee Boldt reported that he had appointed as members of the Semi-Centennial Endowment Fund Committee the following: Trustees Boldt, Mason, Moody, Patten, Schwab, Straight, Tansey, R. H. Treman and J. DuPratt White.
- 27. Resolved, That the proposal of the Executor of the estate of Bernice Haviland Guernsey to give to the University a paid up insurance policy upon the life of the life tenant for the amount of the estate to be paid to the University at his death be approved and it was

Resolved, That President J. G. Schurman be authorized to execute a release of the interest of the University in policy No. 654,633 issued by the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company, of Newark, N. J., on the life of Lucius W. Guernsey heretofore assigned to the University as temporary security on condition that same is approved by the University attorney.

28. The matter of the assessment for taxation of houses owned by the University and leased to its employees was referred to the University Attorney and Comptroller with power.

29. Whereas, Beginning with the year of the typhoid epidemic, 1903, and since that date, the demands on the University have exceeded its income and consequently it has been impossible to increase the endowment for the University by adding to it the income on the so-called Cornell Endowment Reserve Fund, and

WHEREAS, It is probable that for some years to come all the available income of the University will be necessary to meet its current expense and wipe out the present deficit in current income, be it

Resolved, That the Resolution of October 25, 1902, be rescinded and that the Cornell Endowment Reserve Fund be merged with the Cornell Endowment Fund.

To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University.
GENTLEMEN:

The following report of the inspection of the fraternity houses, dormitories and private rooming houses for the year 1915-16 is respectfully submitted; All the houses and buildings wherein were located the students of the University were carefully and thoroughly inspected during the past year, particular attention being given to fire danger and facilities provided to escape therefrom. It is gratifying to report that with few exceptions conditions were found to be satisfactory. Some of the homes offered to the students by the residents of Ithaca are exceptionally attractive, large airy rooms. well kept, very nicely furnished, with every convenience and comfort. and with refined surroundings, rendering them of high standard in every way, unfortunately this class is limited in number; then there is a large class of comfortable, homey places to choose from, and finally the typical rooming houses with every available space used. In most cases these are well kept and safe, but the question of comfort depends upon the needs of the individual; it is quite possible that a salutary influence is exerted over this latter class from the fact that they are under the surveillance of University inspection, at least that is the conclusion reached by the writer.

There was compiled and printed, and distributed through the office of the Secretary of the University and other bureaus of information, to prospective students, a list of such rooming houses as fulfilled the requirements demanded for approval as safe and satisfactory houses for student occupancy. This annual list which gives the locations, prices and other pertinent information of rooming houses is not only a great help to those seeking residence here, but its value is highly appreciated by the house owners as well, who are thus brought into direct communication with prospective roomers, and as the standards required for entry therein are constantly rising, the class of offerings

is correspondingly improving from year to year. It is interesting to note that since University Dormitories have become a fact, greater effort to offer attractive homes to students is being made, and the competition so produced will become a benefit to those students who will be obliged to live outside the homes provided by the University.

With reference to the list of approved houses, it is well to state, so that there may be no misunderstanding, that only approximately one half of the houses occupied by students are enumerated on this list, not necessarily because they occupy houses not worthy of approval for there are many approved houses, whose owners do not wish to have appear on the published list. However there are a large number of students who live in houses from which approval has been withheld for some reason, regardless of that fact, attracted possibly by a monetary consideration or some other inducement offered. This class of houses is the most difficult to deal with and where most misunderstandings arise.

Cooperation with the Student Rooming Agency still continues to work satisfactorily, although there was a tendency on the part of some individual agents, to continue some of the practices which had, in the past, caused friction, but these tendencies were readily overcome.

The standard rooming contract is increasing in popularity and its permanent and general use seems to be assured.

A growing and interesting feature of the work are the many requests from both house owners and students for consultations or advice on matters appertaining to the rooming question in its many phases, and the writer feels confident that many a misunderstanding has been avoided by a good natured discussion of seemingly serious problems.

The Cooperation of Lieut. Twesten and the Freshman Advisory Committee, through its president, is most helpful. The Fraternities are as a rule, greatly interested in fire protection, and more general and careful attention to the subject is manifest. It is a noticeable fact, however, that interest in these matters will show marked variance from year to year in some of the fraternities, due no doubt to the change in personnel of the officers in charge thereof, and in those cases where laxity is apparent, it is necessary to force home, with considerable vigor, the vital importance of the question. New fraternity houses are being constructed from time to time, but the new buildings are, for the most part, fire proof or nearly so, notable examples of which are the splendid new homes of Delta Chi and Beta Theta Pi. The practice was continued of sending letters to the fraternities and clubs at Junior Week and other special occasions, when their houses are apt to be filled with guests, calling attention to the dangers which might arise in case of fire, and charging them to be particularly watchful at those times when conditions are ripe for disaster.

The assured protection offered by Prudence Risley for the women, and the Residential Halls, so far provided, for the men leaves nothing to be desired as far as safety is concerned, but renders us the more anxious for a greater number of buildings of the same type.

At Sage College the new bases to the outside fire-escapes have been completed, thus permitting those using them to descend clear to the ground, and avoid the risk of broken limbs as was heretofore the case; any danger of annoyance by intruders or thieves by way of the fire ladders is obviated by the woven wire cages in which the bases of the ladders land. It is a great and much needed improvement. The fire alarm has been overhauled and is to be improved. Fire drills and other preparedness features are practiced, and these with the numerous exits provided and guarded by a nightwatchman would seem to render the occupants of Sage College well protected. Cascadilla Building, since being remodeled and supplied with fire-proof inclosed stairways, and ample outside iron fire escapes is well equipped to meet almost any emergency.

The City of Ithaca maintains an excellent fire department, well equipped with modern fire fighting apparatus, which responds with great promptness to all University alarms. The University recently donated to the city \$5,000 toward providing additional apparatus to be located on College Avenue, the center of the rooming house district, and close to the Campus, thus giving added protection to University interests. In addition to the City Department, the University maintains a fire fighting force of its own, consisting of a company of 8 men, students who live in the fire house on the Campus, and an engineer, who lives at Sibley College, together with appropriate apparatus, consisting of 3 hose carts and hose, one hook and ladder truck, and an adequate supply of pumps, stand-pipes and hydrants located at convenient places around the Campus. The University also has an electric fire alarm system, which is connected with that of the city, thus assuring prompt and efficient response to all alarms.

December 2, 1916.

Trustee Williams was called to the chair.

Regrets were received from Trustees Hiscock, VanCleef and Westinghouse, and Faculty Representative Willcox and their absence excused.

Action was taken as follows:

- 1. The resignation on account of illness of P. D. Williams, Reading Assistant in Economics, effective November 24th, was presented and accepted.
- 2. Resolved, That E. R. Sikes, Reading Assistant in Economics, at a salary of \$250 be appointed Assistant at a salary of \$500 for the year, less the amount which has been paid to P. D. Williams, resigned, to do the work of his own position and that of Williams.
- 3. Resolved, That Rudolph Sandburg be appointed Reading Assistant in Economics at a salary of \$250 per annum (but not free tuition), salary to date from the beginning of the present academic year (vice P. P. Wilson, who did not report for duty).
- 4. The resignation of K. S. Gibson, Instructor in Physics, was presented and accepted, effective Nov. 20th.

To carry on the work of Mr. Gibson for the remainder of the current term it was

Resolved, That E. P. T. Tyndall be appointed Assistant in Physics from Dec. 1 to the remainder of the term with salary at the rate of \$400 per annum, and that R. W. King be engaged for three months from Nov. 20 on part time with compensation at the rate of \$1,000 per annum (i. e. \$156 for the 3 months).

- 5. Resolved, That Professor C. V. P. Young be authorized to expend during the current term \$75 of the \$1,000 salary appropriated for the gymnasium assistantship, now vacant, to pay for student assistance to aid him in carrying on the work formerly done by that assistant.
- 6. \$560 or so much thereof as may be needed, was appropriated for additional clerical assistance in the office of the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

- 7. A temporary appropriation of \$100 per month was made to provide for the work of the Secretary of the College of Arts and Sciences, Mr. E. S. Morris, who is absent on account of serious illness.
- 8. In view of the fact that the income from the Summer Session of 1916 amounted to over \$39,000, instead of \$33,700 as estimated, the appropriation for the summer session of 1917, was increased to \$35,000.
- 9. The President reported that because of increased registration in chemical microscopy and sanitary chemistry he had authorized the employment of an additional assistant, and it was voted that his action be confirmed and to fill this position it was

Resolved, That R. T. Summers be appointed Assistant in Chemistry from Dec. 1st with salary at the rate of \$425 per annum (but not free tuition).

- 10. An appropriation not exceeding \$20 per month, chargeable to the income of the residential halls for women, was made for temporary assistance in the office of the Adviser of Women.
- II. \$100 or so much thereof as may be needed, was appropriated for the use of the Adviser of Women in social ways, for the benefit of the women students, especially those outside of the residential halls.
- 12. \$300 from the income of the Schiff Fund was made available to pay the salary of the German teacher to maintain a training class for teachers in the Summer Session of 1917.
- 13. The President reported the receipt from Mr. James Gordon Bennett of \$1,000 to endow the James Gordon Bennett Prize of \$50 founded by Mr. Bennett some years since and awarded annually for work done in local and generalized anaesthesia, especially in small animals, and the Secretary was instructed to transmit to Mr. Bennett the sincere thanks of the Trustees for his generous action.
- 14. An application of Professor A. E. Wells for admission to the benefits of the Wm. H. Sage Pension Fund was laid over until a future meeting on account of the consideration of changes in the administration of the Carnegie Pension Fund, which may make advisable changes in the rules covering the University Fund.
- 15. The Comptroller was authorized to replace the present insurance carried upon University property with new policies extending for a period of five years at the rate of 72 cents for that period without coinsurance.
- 16. The Comptroller was authorized to execute a consent to the combining of the two telephone companies in Ithaca when approved in form by the University Attorney.
- 17. The Deans and the Consulting Committees from the faculties of Arts and Sciences, Civil Engineering and Architecture were present

and discussed with the Committee the general question of the proposed change in tuition rates.

COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

New York City, Dec. 23, 1916.

Present—Chairman Edwards, Trustees Schurman, Sackett, Westervelt, Blood, J. DuPratt White, and Superintendent Curtis.

Mr. C. N. Lowrie met with the Committee.

Action was taken as follows:

Trustee Sackett presented the following report by Mr. Lowrie:

December 22, 1916.

Henry W. Sackett, Esq., Tribune Bldg., New York, My dear Col. Sackett:

I submit the following memoranda of subjects which may seem desirable to discuss at the proposed meeting of the Buildings and Grounds Committee tomorrow afternoon.

These subjects might include: First: The general arrangement of roadways, paths and trolley location in the vicinity of the new Armory and Athletic Fields. Second: Planting problems at several points on the University Campus. Third: A communication from George S. Tarbell relative to the development of Cornell Avenue west of University Avenue. Fourth: The project of the Department of Landscape Art for the use of certain lands along Forest Home Road and Judd Falls Road and the buildings of the Department of Agriculture, for the purpose of an Arboretum. Fifth: The application of the Pageant Committee to make certain improvements in Cascadilla Gorge for use as an out-door theatre.

Some comments on these subjects may be of interest, as follows:

First: Treatment around Armory and entrance to Athletic Field. This interesting and important subject was discussed at a meeting last summer in Ithaca of your Committee with Mr. Curtis and myself, since which time alternative plans have been submitted for the general circulation of roadways, paths and trolley traffic in this region. Of these two suggestions, the one designated as Suggestion No. 1 seems to me to be more desirable and to fit the situation in a fairly adequate manner.

I have, however, shown upon blue print copy sent to me a number of slight modifications which it seems to me would improve the treatment from both an aesthetic and a practical point of view.

Most of these modifications are more or less obvious but one or two call for a brief explanation.

A—It would seem desirable to provide more space between the trolley and the eight foot walk which runs more or less parallel therewith both for the sake of appearance and of safety in times of great crowds.

B—The approach roadway to the Athletic Field would be improved if it could reach the existing double roadway at the Gymnasium by a straight line centered upon the existing central parking space, as shown upon the plan. A realignment of this nature would throw the proposed ticket booths and the proposed grand stand slightly further south which would give more much needed space to the baseball entrance also a much handsomer approach to the larger field to the east.

Other changes in minor details are shown upon the plans. Parking spaces seem to be adequate.

Second: Planting: A—Elms at Goldwin Smith Hall: The present line of young elm trees on the easterly side of the quadrangle in the vicinity of Goldwin Smith Hall should in my judgment be extended so that the line would come in front of Goldwin Smith Hall except for the central portico. A possible criticism of this treatment would be that Goldwin Smith Hall would be obscured from the quadrangle. Such, however, would not be the case, on account of the habit of growth of the American Elm, to any extent, and in fact the appearance of the building would be greatly enhanced with this foreground foliage and the partial concealment of the roof. The points of architectural interest would be improved with this supporting foliage.

B—At the north side of Sibley and Rand Halls the present conditions are unattractive. I would recommend a very low screen planting, as indicated on the planting plan submitted. This would provide an informal avenue effect of Elms, underneath which at certain points would be low shrubbery with dwarf trees at intervals, the purpose of which would be to make less prominent the unsightly rears of Sibley, the Mechanical Laboratory, the Foundry and Rand Hall. This simple and inexpensive treatment would help conditions in this section of University Avenue greatly.

C—At Halls of Residence certain changes are desirable in planting conditions. Along West Avenue the marginal grass strip between the new sidewalk and a proposed curb line should be widened so that the width would be the same as that between this sidewalk and the top of a slope towards the new buildings, thus giving a more balanced width of grass which would also provide space for trees.

In this region also a better junction of West and University Avenues is possible. This situation was gone over carefully with Mr. Curtis and is understood by him; but it would seem desirable for him to prepare a detailed drawing of the situation and submit same for approval.

At the foundations of the new halls of residence a very much more interesting kind of planting material could be used than that which has been temporarily provided. This would contemplate the use of

evergreen trees, shrubs, and vines, the latter to be planted sparingly, by which process a much richer foliage effect would be secured. For the accomplishing of this object it has been suggested that the Department of Landscape Art should work with Mr. Curtis, first submitting a planting arrangement for approval.

Third: On the subject of Mr. Tarbell's request it is difficult to make any definite recommendation without more intimate knowledge of the actual physical condition. This would seem to necessitate a visit to inspect the ground at some future date.

Fourth: Arboretum: There are great possibilities in the way of an arboretum in connection with the University but such a project necessarily implies a term of occupancy of an indefinite extent in order that the trees may grow to maturity. It would thus seem wise to limit such a project to flowers and shrubs so far as making any definite reservations of the ground are concerned near to possible buildings.

On the other hand I can see no objection to the permitting of tree planting, providing it is done with the understanding that some of these would be subject to destruction from future building extensions.

Fifth: Out-door Theatre in Cascadilla Gorge: On this subject I have no definite information regarding plans for the treatment of the ground, and should be pleased to be advised further.

The report was adopted with the following changes,—First Section:

Item A. The 8-ft. walk mentioned in the report and shown on print of Drawing L-1016, marked Suggestion No. 1, between road and trolley track to be moved west of the trolley track.

Item B. The ticket booths and grandstand to remain as shown on print of Drawing L-1016, marked Suggestion No. 1. The location of the approach roadway to the Athletic Field to be moved north opposite the booths and to be extended east in a straight line. The double roadway in front of Schoellkopf Memorial to be widened so that the center line of the central parking space in the new location will coincide with the extended center line of the approach roadway.

Parking space for a single line of cars is to be provided the full width of the play ground across its south end.

Second Section. Plant.

Item A. Elms at Goldwin Smith Hall.

Four (4) elms to be planted, two (2) each side of Central portico in line with those now there.

Item B. All large trees to be omitted south of University Avenue. Planting to be omitted at Rand Hall. Only such low planting along Mach. Laboratory as will not interfere with the light.

Mr. Lowrie to make and submit to the Committee detached plan showing suggested treatment of the intersection at West and University Avenues.

Planting at the Residential Halls for men to be studied by Professors Davis and Curtis of the Landscape Art Dept. of the Agricultural College and Supt. Curtis. Plan to be submitted by them to Mr. Lowrie and to be put into effect on the approval of Chairman Edwards and Trustee Sackett.

The following letter from Mr. George S. Tarbell was read by Col. Sackett:

ITHACA, N. Y., Nov. 21, 1916.

Henry W. Sackett, Esq., Tribune Building, 154 Nassau Street,

New York City.

My dear Mr. Sackett:

I am advised that the matter of development of Cornell Avenue at Llenroc in harmony with the residential halls property, has been referred to your sub-committee, and I beg to ask for any advice that you may see fit to give with relation to the treatment of Cornell Avenue, its grade, sidewalk and possible entrance gateway, and stone or concrete stairway from University Avenue up to Cornell Avenue, next north of the cemetery.

Also whether you would recommend trees along the border of the cemetery and if so, what trees. I hope that you or your landscape architect may, on behalf of the University, give us suggestions that will have a tendency to improve the property in harmony with the residential halls and give it more the appearance of a quasi University Park, before we enter upon our final plan.

Curtis stating that plans for the treatment of the South end of the Residential Halls track are so indefinite that it is not practical to make any suggestions at this time, that we appreciate the offer and that the University's Landscape Architect will be glad to confer with him.

Moved and carried that a plan of Drill Hall roads be prepared and submitted to the Board for an appropriation to construct the same. The improvement to extend along garden Avenue to Bailey Hall.

Moved and carried that an additional appropriation of \$2,500 be recommended to complete the Observatory.

Moved and carried that two (2) night watchmen be employed and that they patrol such University buildings as the Comptroller and Superintendent deem most advisable. Moved and carried that the janitorial service and the furnishing of janitorial supplies be taken over by the Department of Buildings and Grounds.

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

January 6, 1917.

Regrets were received from Trustee Pound and his absence excused.

The minutes of the meeting of December 2, 1916, were approved as printed.

Action was taken as follows:

- 1. A committee consisting of President Schurman, the Chairman of this Committee and Trustee Hiscock was appointed to draft on behalf of the Trustees a resolution on the death of Trustee Boldt and to communicate the proposed resolution to members of the Board and if no objection is raised to transmit the same to the family of Mr. Boldt.
- 2. The action of the President in postponing, on account of the death of Mr. Boldt, the meeting of the full Board called for January 6, 1917, was approved.
- 3. The matter of the renewal of the telephone contracts was referred to the Chairman and the Comptroller with power.
- 4. The President presented notice of the intended retirement of Rolla C. Carpenter, Professor of Experimental Engineering, to take effect at the June Commencement, 1917, as he will have reached the age of sixty-five years, and the President was authorized to apply to the Carnegie Foundation for the retiring allowance for Professor Carpenter.
- 5. The President reported that Professor Gage was tendering to the University a fund for research in Physics, in accordance with the following memorandum.

"Ithaca, N. Y. U. S. A., Dec. 26, 1916.

The Susanna Phelps Gage Fund for Research in Physics in Cornell University.

A fund of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) given by Simon Henry Gage, B.S., 1877, and Henry Phelps Gage, A.B., 1908, Ph.D., 1911, as a memorial to Susanna Phelps Gage, Ph.B., 1880, the first woman to take laboratory work in Physics in Cornell University, and who by her subsequent career showed the highest appreciation of the need for research in our country.

It is the wish of the donors of this fund that the income be administered by the Professors of Physics with the cooperation of the President of the University; and that it be used in any way which at the time gives promise of advancing knowledge in Physics. The income could therefore be properly applied to a graduate fellowship or scholarship, the purchase of apparatus, of books and periodicals or for any other purpose which at the time and the occasion gives promise of advancing knowledge.

The first instalment of income to become available at the beginning of the second half century of the University, 1918-1919.

Dated December 26, 1916 (Anniversary of the birth of Susanna Phelps Gage, Dec. 26, 1857).

(Signed) SIMON H. GAGE.

And it was

Resolved, That the gift be accepted upon the terms outlined and the Secretary instructed to convey to Professor Gage and his son, Henry Phelps Gage, the sincere thanks of the Trustees for their generous action.

6. The Comptroller reported that Professor Gage for the endowment above mentioned had tendered to the University the following securities, which, with the accumulated income from same it was estimated would amount to \$10,000 on July 1, 1918.

And it was resolved that the securities tendered be accepted in payment of the endowment.

7. The President presented correspondence in regard to and the Will of Eudorus C. Kenney of the Class of 1882, who died December 24, 1916, at Washington, D. C. By the Will Mr. Kenney's estate was left to the University "to be owned, held and invested in the same manner as other similar funds belonging to said University and the net annual income thereof to be used for one or more scholarships, as

the amount may be sufficient in the judgment of the authorities of said University—said scholarships to be competed for in the manner designated by said University authorities, excepting, that, if at any time there be an applicant from the town of Truxton, Cortland Co., N. Y., competent to enter the University in the judgment of said University authorities, he or she shall be accorded the scholarship without competition, and, if at any such time there are more such applicants than there are scholarships open, said University authorities shall select the one or ones most worthy to receive the benefits of said scholarships. The scholarships endowed by this will and testament shall be denominated The Eudorus C. Kenney Scholarships."

- 8. It was resolved that the matter of the probate of the Will of Mr. Kenney and the administration of the Estate be referred to the University attorney with power, and that the Comptroller be authorized to execute on behalf of the University any and all papers necessary to be executed leading up to the probate of the Will and the appointment of an Administrator with the Will Annexed and incident to the administration of the estate, and to attach to said papers the corporate seal of the University.
- 9. The President reported that the terms of office of the initial elected members of the Conference Committee of the Graduate School had been fixed as follows: E. L. Nichols for 3 years, C. H. Hull for 2 years.
- 10. Resolved, That the President be authorized to confer degrees upon candidates who are recommended therefor by their respective faculties on any date prior to Commencement, 1917.
- 11. Resolved, That leave of absence without salary be granted to Professor A. E. Wells for a period of nine months, from December 15, 1916, to September 15, 1917, to enable him to take up the business management of the Thomas Aeroplane Company, and thus gain experience for himself which will benefit Sibley College.
- 12. Resolved, That Professors J. Laurence Laughlin and F. W. Taussig be appointed special lecturers in the Department of Economics and Political Science, each to give a course of three public lectures (in January and March, respectively), and to receive as a compensation therefor \$300 (payable from the \$1,000 set aside for lectures in that Department during the absence of Professor Willcox).
- 13. Resolved, That F. G. Brink be appointed assistant in Physical Training vice E. Shevlin, resigned, at a salary of \$500, for a period from January 2nd to the end of the academic year.
- 14. The resignations of L. E. Jenks and E. B. Johnson, Assistants in Chemistry, effective December 12, were presented and accepted.
- G. E. Wightman, Assistant in Chemistry, who has been ordered to the Mexican border, was granted a leave of absence without salary, from December 11.

Resolved, That J. M. Jaffin and F. M. Levy, be appointed Assistants in Chemistry from December 12, each with salary at the rate of \$425 per annum but not free tuition (vice Assistants Jenks and Johnson, resigned).

Resolved, That F. L. Browne be appointed Assistant in Chemistry from December 11 until the return of Assistant Wightman, with salary at the rate of \$425 per annum but not free tuition.

Further Resolved, That the salary of A. E. McKinney be increased from \$400 to \$500 per annum; the first payment at the higher rate to be of Jan. 15 (Provision for salary was made in budget).

- 15. Resolved, That Dean Mann be authorized to employ Leroy Anderson as Instructor in Extension Schools in the College of Agriculture for 4½ months on the available statutory salary at the rate of \$275 per month, effective December 26, 1916.
- 16. The following recommendation by the University Faculty of December 13, 1916, was adopted.
- "Resolved, That the University Faculty recommend to the Board of Trustees that a reinstatement fee of twenty-five dollars be charged to every student who has been dropped from the University for delinquency in scholarship or conduct, except for such delinquency in scholarship as is due to ill health or to other reasons beyond the student's control, in which case the fee may be remitted upon recommendation of the Dean of the college in which the student is registered."
- 17. The matter of the salary to be paid the Adviser of Women was referred to the President with power.
- 18. The President in accordance with the prior understanding presented the formal application of Professor Moler to be admitted to the benefits of the Professorial Pension Fund as of December 11, 1916, and the request was granted.
- 19. It was Resolved, that the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences be authorized to grant the use for public performances of Room B, Goldwin Smith Hall, to organizations recognized by the Committee on Student Affairs and under the control of the several departments of Language and Literature and Public Speaking, with permission to charge an admission fee only large enough to cover the necessary costs involved.
- 20. There was presented the following resolution of the University Faculty of December 13, 1916.
- "WHEREAS, A letter written by a member of this Faculty to a bookseller in Germany has been referred to the University Faculty by the Board of Trustees,

Resolved, That this Faculty regards it as regrettable that such a letter was written, but recommends to the Board of Trustees that no further action on the subject be taken."

21. The following was presented.

Ithaca, N. Y., December 27, 1916.

To the Committee on General Administration

of the Board of Trustees of Cornell University.

GENTLEMEN:

On November 11, 1916, the Board of Trustees adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That a committee consisting of Trustees Edwards, Pound, Willcox, C. E. Treman, Ickelheimer and Boldt, be appointed to consider the matter of increasing the tuition to be charged in the several courses in the University, and to report at the January meeting of this Board, and that copies of their report be sent to the members of the Board at least one week prior to the meeting."

Since this action was taken the meeting of the Board called for January 6, 1917, has been postponed and accordingly our report $i_{\rm S}$ addressed to the Committee on General Administration for consideration, if desired, at its meeting of January 6, 1917.

The arguments which led a similar committee to recommend and the Board of Trustees to decide upon an increase of tuition in 1913, are set forth in the report of that committee printed in the Proceedings of the Board of Trustees for January 18, 1913. (Proceedings pp. 111-123). That the present financial situation of the University makes a further increase of tuition imperative appears from the report of Mr. Edwards as Alumni Trustee, printed in the Cornell Alumni News for July, 1916.

TUITION IN THE UNDERGRADUATE COLLEGES.

The present rates of tuition in the various undergraduate colleges of Cornell University are as follows:

But tuition is free to New York State students in the Veterinary College or the College of Agriculture.

Your Committee recommends that in all these undergraduate colleges, beginning with the academic year 1917-18, tuition be fixed at \$150 a year and that for the third term in agriculture it be fixed at This involves raising the tuition from \$125 to \$150 for all regular students liable for tuition in the College of Arts and Sciences (1,008) in the second term of last year) or in the College of Law (192 in the second term of last year), and for all students liable for tuition in the College of Agriculture (278 in the second term of last year). It involves also raising the tuition for all students liable for tuition in the Veterinary College (16 in the second term of last year) from \$100 to \$150. It does not involve any change in the amount of tuition charged to students in the Medical College, the College of Architecture, the College of Civil Engineering, Sibley College, the Summer Session, the Summer School in Agriculture or the Winter Courses in Agriculture. If the recommendations are adopted and the numbers of students paying tuition in the several colleges for the academic year 1917-18 should be the same that they were in the second term of 1915-16, slightly smaller in most cases than they were in the first term, the amount of increase from tuition would be approximately thirtyeight thousand dollars.

Your Committee further recommends that the heads of departments and colleges consider the matter of departmental and laboratory fees, with a view of making them cover the actual cost of material and use of equipment, and submit such modifications of the present charges as they may deem advisable for approval by the Committee on General Administration.

Your Committee is convinced that, unless the University's income is enlarged by some other method, another increase of tuition will be necessary in the near future and accordingly suggests to the Trustees the wisdom of now announcing that, beginning with the academic year 1921-22, tuition to all undergraduate colleges may be fixed at \$175 a year and that of the third term in Agriculture at \$87.50.

TUITION IN THE GRADUATE SCHOOL.

A graduate student now pays ordinarily the same tuition as is charged to undergraduates in the college where the major work of the graduate student lies. But graduate students doing all their work in Agriculture pay no tuition, those doing most of their work in Agriculture, but one minor in a college where tuition is required pay one-sixth of the tuition required in the latter college, and those doing a major in some college where tuition is required but one or both minors in Agriculture are exempt from one-sixth or one-third re-

spectively of their tuition. This complex system has resulted in various administrative inconveniences and anomalies.

Two different systems of charging fees and tuition to graduate students have been submitted by the members of the faculty of the graduate school. As the total amount involved, compared with the tuition of the undergraduates is small, and as your committee wished to consider the suggested changes more in detail, it was not deemed advisable that a recommendation be made at this time. Should an agreement be reached before the meeting of the Committee on General Administration, a definite recommendation will be presented for consideration

Also, that the Treasurer be authorized to honor requisitions to the above amount.
- 23. A communication from Dean Mann in regard to the use of a portion of the Kline property by the Department of Poultry Husbandry was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.
- 24. The University Attorney reported that the University had successfully defended a suit instituted against it by the Window Cleaning Company of New York and that the litigation had been in charge of Mr. Mann of the legal staff of the New York Central Railroad Company and that Mr. Mann had contributed his services in the matter without charge. The Secretary was instructed to convey to Mr. Mann the appreciation of the Trustees of his generous action.
 - 25. The following resignations were presented and accepted.

Henry Mueller to be Assistant in Pathology at a salary of \$750 per per annum; effective October 1st. (Provision for salary made by Council Nov. 18).

- B. S. Barringer, now Instructor in Clinical Surgery, Department of Urology, without salary to be paid from December 1st a salary at the rate of \$200 per annum, that being the amount appropriated for the salary of D. W. MacKenzie, who resigned Nov. 30.

A letter from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, advising of the approval by the Committee on General Administration, of the minutes of the meetings of the Medical College Council held on October 21, 1916, and November 18, 1916, were presented and placed on file.

Moved and carried that the Medical College Council make recommendations to the Board of Trustees as follows:

- 1. That an appropriation not to exceed \$175.00 be made for special printing for the Department of Anatomy.
- 2. That Doctor Lewis A. Conner be appointed as Acting Dean, in the absence of Dean Polk, whenever the occasion may arise.
- 3. That in the case of Mr. Gerson Garb, a first year student who was obliged to withdraw from College on November 9, 1916, on account of financial difficulties, three quarters (34) of the tuition and laboratory fees paid by him amounting to \$82.50 be refunded.
- 4. The President presented two (2) communications from the Comptroller of the University showing the financial condition of the

Medical College and the sums received and paid by the College as interest on loans, which were considered and placed on file.

- 5. It was moved and carried that the Dean, Doctor Stimson and Doctor Conner be appointed a Committee to effect an equitable division of the receipts from Compensation Cases up to December 31, 1915, as provided in the resolution adopted by the Council December 18, 1915; and that the Committee also be instructed to recommend a plan of administering the business arising under the Compensation law in the dispensary and that has arisen since January 1, 1916.
- 6. That special compensation of \$250.00 be paid to Doctor C. L. Gibson for extra work done by him in the Department of Surgery, during the present term.
- 7. That Mr. Willson be authorized at an expense not to exceed \$150.00, to reconvert into a developing room for X-Ray work, the room now being used for gastrointestinal work.
- 8. That a Committee consisting of Doctor Stimson and Doctor Conner be appointed to observe and report from time to time, upon the subject of the manufacture and sale of animal products in the Loomis Laboratory.
- 9. Doctor Conner reported that after investigation he had reduced the item of \$1,450.00 appropriated for the Department of Medicine at the November meeting of the Council to \$500.00.

Dispensary reports, including receipts from Compensation Cases and from the Department of Experimental Medicine, for the month of November, 1916, were presented and placed on file.

Moved and carried that the minutes of this meeting be approved as read.

With the consent of all members of the Committee, the Comptroller was authorized to purchase \$25,000 of the American Smelters Securities Company Preferred "B" Stock and to exchange same into the first mortgage bonds of the American Smelting and Refining Company.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE.

Regrets were presented from Trustees Westinghouse and Pound and their absence excused.

The special Committee reported that the following resolution had been approved by the members of the Board of Trustees, and copies were being prepared to be sent to the family of Mr. Boldt:

"The Trustees of Cornell University record with profound regret the death, on the 5th of December, 1916, of their esteemed colleague, George C. Boldt.

"Mr. Boldt became a member of the Board on October 28th, 1905; and from that day to the end of his life he was distinguished by his interest in the University, his devotion to its welfare, and his laborious efforts for its material improvement and advancement. During the latter years of his life the business of the University occupied much of his time and attention, taking precedence sometimes of his personal affairs. While he was fully alive to the supreme importance of the educational work of the institution, his duties as a trustee brought him into responsible relation with its business affairs, and he made the erection of the proposed group of students' Residential Halls the object of his special concern and effort. The four Halls already completed bear eloquent testimony to his succes in cultivating interest and securing support.

"In the death of Mr. Boldt the University has lost a friend and helper who bestowed upon her the highest gifts—sincere interest, deep affection, and abounding service and good works. In a real sense he gave himself to the University, and identified himself so largely with her life and activities that, though not originally of the academic household, she became for him a veritable *Alma Mater*. And no alumnus ever loved or served her better.

The Trustees also mourn the loss of a valued member of this Board. Mr. Boldt's common sense, good judgment, and ripe and varied experience made him a wise counselor; and the board freely availed itself of his advice on the business that came before it, especially in matters of difficulty. For several years he has been regularly elected to serve as Chairman of the Board. As a presiding officer he was considerate and tactful, informal without being irregular, and skillful and effective in the despatch of business. In the meetings of the Board or of Committees as elsewhere he gave the best that was in him to Cornell University. His fellow Trustees are now painfully sensible

of the great loss which his death has brought to the Board and to the University.

"Mr. Boldt's colleagues on this Board feel also that they have lost a very dear friend. He was a warm-hearted, frank, and brotherly man for whom they had come to entertain genuine affection, and his death affects them like a break in the family circle."

"To Mr. Boldt's son and daughter the Trustees respectfully offer their sincere sympathy in the great bereavement and sorrow that have come upon them in the death of their beloved father."

"THE CARNEGIE FOUNDATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF TEACHING.

January 24, 1917.

My dear President Schurman:

"THE CARNEGIE FOUNDATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF TEACHING.

January 24, 1917.

My dear President Schurman:

I have the honor to inform you that the Executive Committee of this Foundation, at its meeting on January 19, 1917, granted Professor Rolla Clinton Carpenter, a retiring allowance, to be paid as usual through the University, of Nineteen hundred dollars a year (\$1,900), beginning on June 27, 1917.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Trustees in accepting the resignation of Professor Carpenter express their high appreciation of his services to the University for nearly thirty years. As a pioneer in the field of experimental engineering he is held in the highest esteem by all mechanical engineers, and by his writings in this field he has made an assured

place for himself in the annals of his profession. As a teacher and investigator he is affectionately remembered by many generations of students and his retirement from the Faculty of Sibley College will be viewed with great regret by all of his colleagues.

3. The President presented the resignation of Professor William W. Comfort, as Professor of Romance Languages and Literature, to take effect at Commencement, 1917, and the following action taken:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees hereby accepts the resignation of Dr. Comfort as Professor of the Romance Languages and Literatures and head of the Department;

Resolved, That in so doing the Board puts upon record its deep and grateful appreciation of Professor Comfort's services to the University and the cause of higher education during the eight years of his life at Cornell. A scholar preëminently interested in the literature with which his field is rich, he has given himself without stint in class, office and home to students both within and without his classes and especially to many who have come to us from distant lands. He has organized and vivified his Department and his promotion to greater responsibilities will prove a serious loss to Cornell University. The Trustees regret his departure and anticipate for him a distinguished career as the head of his Alma Mater.

- 4. Resolved, That the following action affecting the staff of the College of Agriculture be taken:
- (1) That G. H. Collingwood, Assistant Professor of Forestry, and E. F. Hopkins, Instructor in Plant Pathology, be granted leaves of absence, without prejudice to salary, for one month each in the spring of the current year (in addition to the 3 months' absence to which they are entitled annually) to enable them to carry on their studies in other institutions.
- (2) That C. T. Gregory, Assistant Professor of Plant Pathology, be granted a leave of absence without salary for the months of March, April, May and June to enable him to do some special work for the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
- (3) That Dean Mann be authorized to employ Robert D. Rands (fellow in the Department of Plant Pathology, U. of Wis.) to carry Dr. Gregory's work during his absence, for the salary available for Dr. Gregory.
- (4) That Professor C. H. Tuck be given the privilege of extending his year's leave of absence (which expired February 1st) until June 30, 1917, the additional leave to be without pay.
- 5. Resolved, That this Committee recommend to the Board of Trustees the election of Carl Becker as professor of Modern European History to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Professor Catterall, at a salary of \$4,000 per annum, effective July 1, 1917.

- 6. Resolved, That the following be appointed in the College of Law for the year 1916-17; Judge Harrington Putnam, as lecturer of Admiralty Law at a compensation of \$250; William Macomber as lecturer of Patent Law at a compensation of \$250.
- 7. Resolved, That Ralph L. Emmons be appointed reading assistant in Economics with salary at the rate of \$250 per annum, the first payment to be made as of December 15th, 1916, and that he be exempted from the payment of tuition for the second term.
- S. Resolved, That to provide for the duplication of Physics courses for students in Sibley College for the purpose of rearranging the curriculum the following changes be made in the staff in Physics for the 2nd term of the current academic year:
- R. W. King appointed Instructor (half time) with salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum.
- J. R. Jenness and L. J. Sivian, now assistants at \$400 and \$500 respectively, promoted to Instructorships, each with salary at the rate of \$800 per annum.
- L. R. Koller, now Assistant on half time at rate of \$200 per annum, to work three-fourths time with salary at the rate of \$300 per annum.
- R. E. Bitner appointed Assistant (three-fourths time) with salary at the rate of \$300 per annum.

Further *Resolved*, That L. Larkin be appointed Assistant in Physics (half time) for the second term with salary at the rate of \$200 per annum (to assist in the X-ray laboratory).

9. G. E. Wightman, Assistant in Chemistry, who was granted a leave of absence from December 11, returned to his work January 20, on which date W. A. Douglass, Assistant in Chemistry, resigned; therefore

Resolved, That F. L. Browne, who was appointed Assistant in Chemistry vice Wightman be continued from January 20th, vice Douglass, resigned.

- 10. Resolved, That Professor B. F. Kingsbury be appointed Acting Secretary of the Ithaca Division of the Medical College during the absence of Dr. Kerr on Sabbatic leave for the second term of the current academic year, without additional compensation.
- 11. Resolved, That Anthony Brown be appointed Student Assistant in Physiology for the second term at a salary of \$125 for the term (amount available in budget).
- 12. On the nomination of the President the Staff of the Summer Session for 1917 was appointed as follows:

13. The salaries of G. W. Race and G. A. Culligan, mechanicians in the mechanical and electrical laboratories were increased to \$1,000 per annum to date from February 1, 1917.

- 14. \$150 or so much thereof as may be necessary was appropriated to the Committee on Vocational Guidance for Women to cover the expense of providing lectures.
- 15. A communication was presented from the Faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, containing the following resolution:
- "Resolved, That the Faculty recommend to the Board of Trustees that a fine of \$2.00 be imposed on students who fail to file their study cards within the authorized period."

After consideration, it was *Resolved*, That the recommendation be referred to the University Faculty for consideration in connection with the general subject of the imposition of fines for failure to comply with University and College requirements.

- 16. Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to treat the case of E. E. Morris, formerly Secretary of the College of Art and Sciences, as coming under the ruling of November 7, 1914, and to pay to his widow one-half of his salary.
- 17. A communication from Dean Haskell in regard to extending the time system now in use in Lincoln Hall to Goldwin Smith Hall at an estimated cost of \$434 was referred to the Committee considering the Budget for 1917-1918.
- 18. On the recommendation of the University Faculty it was resolved to establish at the University a unit or units of the Reserve Officers Training Corps.
- 19. Consent was given to the erection in Sage Chapel of a bronze memorial tablet to the late Professor Hart.
- 20. It was resolved that a tablet in memory of Professor Charles Babcock be placed in Sage Chapel, and the matter was referred to the President and Trustee Andrew D. White with power.
- 21. A communication from Professor Tanner in regard to the placing of tablets in memory of Professors Waite and Jones was referred to the President and Trustee Andrew D. White to consider and report.
- 22. A communication from Professor Dennis in regard to the manner of computing the cost of materials in the chemical laboratories was referred to the Comptroller with power.
- 23. The Treasurer reported the receipt from the Executors of the Estate of William A. Read of \$4,000, in payment of the balance unpaid on the pledge of Mr. Read of \$1,000 a year for five years toward the salary of men holding positions on the surgical staff of the Cornell Division of the Bellevue Hospital, and it appearing from communications from Professor Hartwell and Clerk J. Thorne Willson, and from an examination of the Will of Mr. Read, that this constituted the only claim of the University against the estate of Mr. Read, the Treasurer was authorized to execute on behalf of the University a release of the estate from all claims by the University, in manner approved by the University Attorney, and to affix thereto the corporate seal of the University.
- 24. It was resolved that the request of Mrs. Hess to be allowed to continue to lease the rooms occupied by her at 7 South Avenue be denied, as it is the policy of the University to rent its property upon the Campus to employees of the University only.
- 25. Dr. A. T. Kerr was authorized to auticipate the appropriation for the year 1916-1917 for the Department of Anatomy to the extent of \$600.
- 26. The Comptroller was authorized to release the Mineral Reservation reserved in the conveyance of land in Township 32 North of

Range 8 West, Chippewa County, Wisconsin, upon the payment of the sum of \$1.00 per acre.

- 27. On the report of the Comptroller it was decided not to purchase the Withburn apartments.
- 28. A communication from the City Attorney in regard to the taking over of that portion of Oak Avenue owned by the University, as a public highway was referred to the Comptroller with power to convey to the City the right to use the portion of the street desired.

On motion adjourned.

By the votes of five members of the Committee it was Resolved that the University sell the rights to subscribe for fifty shares of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company stock accruing to it by virtue of the 500 shares of stock of said road owned by it.

- 2. Resolved, that when this Committee adjourns it be to Saturday, April 21, 1917 at 9 o'clock A.M. sharp, in the President's office, Ithaca.
- 3. The Treasurer presented a copy of the last Will and Testament of Mr. Alfred B. Jenkins of West Orange. N. J., who died December 29, 1916.

By the provisions of his Will in the event of his daughter dying without leaving lawful issue the University, with eleven other institutions of technical learning, was made the residuary legatee.

- 4. Professor A. B. Recknagel was granted a leave of absence for the academic year 1917-1918 without salary.
- 5. Leave of absence under the statute granting Sabbatic Leaves was granted to Professor Leslie D. Hayes for the first term of the year 1917-18 without prejudice to salary upon condition that the work in his Department can be carried on to the satisfaction of the President without additional cost to the University.
- 6. Resolved, That Miguel Zapata be appointed Instructor in the Romance Languages for the current term at a salary of \$500 for the term (This being an additional appointment made necessary by increased registration this term).
- 7. Resolved, That L. B. Hoisington be appointed Assistant in Psychology for the current term at a salary of \$250 for the the term (this being an additional appointment made necessary by increased registration this term).
- 8. Resolved, That on account of increased registration in the course in elementary Geology \$5. be appropriated for additional assistance in the department of Geology during the current term.
- 9. The resignation, effective February 28, of C. A. Warner, Assistant in Physical Geography, was presented and accepted, and it was

Resolved, That A. W. Marshall be appointed Assistant to fill out the unexpired term with salary at the rate of \$200 per annum.

10. The resignation, effective February 19th, of P. W. Townsend, Assistant in Ancient History, was presented and accepted, and on the recommendation of Professor Sill it was

Resolved, That J. G. Schurman, Jr., who has already completed his hours for graduation, be appointed Assistant to fill out the unexpired period on the same terms, *i. e.*, with salary at the rate of \$350 per annum and free tuition.

11. In the Department of Chemistry the following changes were made for the balance of the current year.

The resignation of F. M. Levy was accepted as of March 5th.

The resignation of F. L. Browne was accepted as of March 5th.

W. F. Butler was appointed assistant from March 5th at the rate of \$425 per annum, but not free tuition.

Rexford W. Jewett was appointed assistant from February 23rd at the rate of \$425 per annum but not free tuition.

Wm. T. Diefenbach was appointed assistant for the second term at \$200 for the term.

Creig S. Hoyt was appointed assistant for the second term at a salary of \$200 for the term.

H. H. Dann was granted leave of absence without salary from February 23rd to March 3rd.

The salary of A. L. Culbertson, Assistant in Chemistry, now registered as a graduate student was increased, from \$425 (but not free tuition) to \$400 a year and free tuition for the current term.

- 12. Resolved, That Professor C. V. P. Young be authorized to expend during the current term \$75 for student assistance in physical training (payable from the vacant \$1,000 assistantship).
- 13. The resignation, effective at the end of the first term, of C. E. Thomas, Instructor in Experimental Engineering, was presented and accepted, and it was

- 17. Resolved, That H. H. Knight, Instructor in Entomology, paid from the Federal Funds, whose whole time is devoted to research, upon the recommendation of the College of Agriculture, be allowed to conduct his research away from Ithaca for a period of three months.
- 18. K. Dayton, A. T. Volkhardt, and R. B. Hough were appointed assistants in Military Science and Tactics for the current term without compensation other than they receive as Captains in the cadet corps (vice H. M. Elmendorf, K. B. Champ, and F. C. Wilbur, retired.
- 19. The President reported that Sergeants Theodore Nagel, Joseph L. Connolly, Robert J. Mohr, Wilbert Moss and Clifford Childers (appointments to date from Feb. 15, 1917) and Irvin E. Kentner, William S. Arthur, Clarence H. Brigham, Daniel Perettie and James H. Boyle (appointments to date from March 1, 1917) and Grover Pipkin (appointment to date from March 12, 1917) had been detailed by the War Department for duty at Cornell University and they were each appointed Detailed Assistant to the Commandant without salary.
- 20. Upon the recommendation of the General Committee of the Graduate School, the Treasurer was authorized to pay to Alfred Eugene Price, appointed Fellow in Architecture from December 8, 1916, the amount of the Fellowship for the year.
- 21. The Treasurer was authorized to pay to Professor John T. Parson \$100 in appreciation of his services in engrossing University communications.
- 22. Permission was given to Mr. Carroll N. Whitman, a graduate of the College of Law, to take the course in New York practice upon the payment of the tuition fee of \$20.
- 23. The recommendation of the Comptroller that the University install lockers in the New York State Drill Hall, the cost of the same to be paid, from locker fees received, at about \$6,000 a year, was approved and the same referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power.
- 24. \$5,000 was added to the Chemistry appropriation for the current year to cover the increased costs, it being understood that the increased cost of supplies will be covered by the chemical bills charged to students.

- 25. The request of the Associate Alumni for an appropriation of from \$500 to \$600 from the funds collected by the Cornellian Council, in addition to the \$600 already appropriated to carry on the work of the Associate Alumni, was referred to Trustee Matthews to consider and report at the Spring meeting of the Board of Trustees.

- 27. Resolved, That the matter of increase of salary of janitors and other employees of the University be referred to the Committee considering the Budget and in case action is required in any case before the Budget is adopted it be referred to the Comptroller with power.
- 28. The University Attorney made report of the condition of the several matters referred to him, and it was

Resolved, That the matter of the appointment of an Administrator with the Will annexed in the matter of the Estate of Eudorus C. Kenney, deceased, be referred to him with power and in the absence of the Comptroller, the Treasurer be authorized to execute on behalf of the University any papers necessary to the proceedings and to affix the corporate seal thereto.

- 29. The President reported that Professor A. E. Wells, who had received a leave of absence, without salary, from December 15, 1916 to Sept. 15, 1917 for work with the Thomas Aeroplane Co., had returned to Sibley College at the beginning of the 2nd Term, and accordingly his leave of absence from that date is canceled.
- 30. The following was presented, on motion approved, and recommendations therein contained adopted.

- 10. Referring to the communication of Professor C. V. P. Young in regard to the erection of lockers for women students on the play grounds, upon the report of the Sub-Committee, it was

Resolved, That in view of the temporary nature of the play ground no permanent buildings be erected at this time, but the Superintendent was authorized to procure a tent, or to erect a temporary shelter.

- 11. It was referred to the Superintendent to consider the suggestions of the Fire Underwriters and to make recommendations in regard to same and to report them to the President with requests for necessary appropriations.
- 12. Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to make payment on account of the observatory, as authorized by the Chairman, in excess of the appropriations made.
- 13. Chairman Westervelt of the Committee on the Ezra Cornell Statue made a verbal report to the effect that the contract had been let and the work was progressing.
 - 14. Superintendent Curtis reported that a preliminary study showed

that the proposed change in the line and grade of Central Avenue from the stone arch bridge to South Avenue would involve an expenditure of from \$7,000 to \$8,000, and he was authorized to take no further action in the matter until funds are available.

- 15. The Superintendent was authorized to make available for use in case of emergency all stairways in White and Franklin Halls.
- 16. The Superintendent made a report of progress in the matter of plans and estimates of the cost of the development of the Fall Creek water power.

- 3. Resolved, That the Treasurer be requested to submit to the Finance Committee a list of the University's investments, showing cost, par and market values, the same to be presented at a meeting of the Committee to be called by the Chairman prior to the June meeting of the Board of Trustees.
- 4. Resolved, That this Committee recommend to the Board of Trustees that it is inexpedient, in view of the serious condition of national affairs, to make at this time, as a general policy, any increase in the salaries of professors or assistant professors nor any promotion to those positions.
- 5. Resolved, That the Treasurer be requested to confer with the Heads of Departments with a view to carrying out the recommendation of the Special Committee on Tuition as contained in the minutes of the meeting of the Committee on General Administration of January 6, 1917, as follows:

- "Your Committee further recommends that the heads of departments and colleges consider the matter of departmental and laboratory fees, with a view of making them cover the actual cost of material and use of equipment, and submit such modifications of the present charges as they may deem advisable for approval by the Committee on General Administration."
- 6. Resolved, That it be referred to a Committee consisting of the President, the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Committee on General Administration, to make adjustments in the budget to be recommended in respect to Sibley College and the Departments of Physics and Romance Languages, on account of the action heretofore taken.
- 7. Resolved, That the proposed Budget for the year beginning July 1, 1917, as recommended by the President, with such changes as have been made at this meeting, and subject to the action of the Committee just appointed, be approved and recommended to the Board of Trustees for adoption.

Rhodes, Instructor in Chemistry, effective April 15, G. E. Wightman, Assistant in Chemistry, effective April 15, J. H. Michener, Assistant in Chemistry, effective April 26th, H. A. Wichelns, Assistant in Public Speaking, effective April 1. Resignations: L. J. Waldbauer, Assistant in Chemistry, effective May 5, H. H. Dann, Assistant in Chemistry, effective May 1.

- 2. In the Department of Chemistry the following appointments: H. P. Hood, Assistant in Chemistry, with salary at the rate of \$425 per annum (but not free tuition) from May I (vice H. H. Dann, resigned), H. D. Kinney, Assistant in Chemistry, with salary at the rate of \$425 per annum (but not free tuition) from April 30 (vice J. H. Michener, resigned), M. Nichols, Assistant in Chemistry, with salary at the rate of \$425 per annum (but not free tuition) from May 7 (vice L. J. Waldbauer, resigned). Arthur John Rider was promoted from an assistantship to an instructorship with salary at the rate of \$800 per annum, from April 16 (Vice Rhodes, resigned); Edmond J. CORNELL UNIVERSITY MEDICAL COLLEGE COUNCIL.

Meeting, March 17, 1917.

A letter from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees advising of the approval by the Committee on General Administration of the minutes of the Medical College Council of January 20th, 1917, was presented and placed on file.

The President reported that he and Doctor Stimson and Doctor Conner by informal invitation met a Committee of three Governors at the New York Hospital, namely, Mr. Howard Townsend, President, Mr. Edward W. Sheldon, Vice-President, and Mr. David B. Ogden, to discuss with them the project of a union of certain Medical Colleges and Hospitals in the City of New York, and that a copy of the following resolution had been laid before them, namely:

"Resolved, That the President and Vice-President and one other Governor to be nominated by the President are hereby requested and directed to confer with a committee of like number appointed by the Presbyterian Hospital, in respect to a possible combination of the two Hospitals, and to report to this Board with all convenient speed, whether in their opinion such combination is feasible and expedient, and, if that is their opinion, that they should include in their report a provisional plan for such combination which, however, shall be based upon the condition of bringing together the Medical Departments of Columbia University and Cornell University upon terms approved by both hospitals."

Whereupon, it was resolved that this Council refer the matter to the Board of Trustees of Cornell University with the recommendation that the Board appoint a Committee for the consideration of the question.

The Budget for 1917-1918 was presented and considered in a prolonged session and final action upon it and upon suggested modifications was deferred to the next meeting of the Council.

It was moved and carried that the Medical College Council make further recommendations to the Board of Trustees as follows:

April 21, 1917.

Regrets were presented from Trustees Patten, Straight, C. S. Wilson, Shepard, Sessions, Hiscock and Finley and their absences excused.

Trustee Horace White was called to the Chair.

Action was taken as follows:

- 1. The minutes of the meeting of November 11, 1916, as printed, were approved.
- 2. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on General Administration from December 2, 1916, to March 3, 1917, inclusive, as printed, and the minutes of the meeting of April 21, 1917, as read, were approved, and the action therein contained ratified and recommendations adopted.
- 3. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Finance from October 26, 1916, to March 24, 1917, as printed, and the minutes of April 18, 1917, as read, were approved, and the action therein contained ratified and the recommendations adopted, except recommendations contained in paragraphs 1, 2, 4 and 7 of the meeting of March 24th, all referring to the matter of appropriations, action upon which was postponed for later consideration.
- 4. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds from December 23, 1916, to March 3, 1917, inclusive, as printed, were approved, and the action therein contained ratified and the recommendations adopted.
- 5. By ballot duly had Trustee Frank H. Hiscock was unanimously elected Chairman of this Board.
- 6. On the nomination of the Committee on the Semi-Centennial Celebration, Trustee VanCleef was appointed a member of the Committee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Boldt.
- 7. Trustee Pound presented his resignation as a member of the Semi-Centennial Celebration Committee.
- 8. Resolved, That the filling of the vacancies in the Board of Trustees and in the standing committees and special committees be postponed until the June meeting.
- 9 By ballot duly had Carl Becker was elected Professor of Modern European History at a salary of \$4,000 per annum, effective July 1, 1917.

10. The President presented the resignation of W. E. Lunt as Professor of English History, to take effect at the close of the present academic year, and the resignation was accepted with the following minute:

During his five years' residence at the University Professor Lunt has presented an admirable example of teaching ability in combination with productive scholarship. His systematic instruction in English History has appealed to a steadily increasing number of undergraduates. His graduate teaching has exhibited the same competent thoroughness, joined with an infectious enthusiasm for hard and careful work. And he has found time to publish a sheaf of scholarly papers. As a member of the community he has proved agreeable and generous. The Trustees, while viewing his departure with regret, would wish him continued success and happiness in his new home.

The President also presented the resignation of Alfred Hayes as Professor of Law, to take effect at the close of the present academic year, and the following action was taken:

The Board of Trustees of Cornell University in accepting the resignation of Professor Alfred Hayes from the Faculty of the College of Law, avails itself of the opportunity to record its appreciation of his nine years of activity as a member of that Faculty. His teaching was distinguished by marked legal ability, which became unusually effective in the classroom under the stimulus of his energy and ardor. His sympathetic interest in the welfare of his students is recognized by all those who came under his instruction.

- 11. The minutes of the meeting of the Agricultural College Council of April 20, 1917, were read and approved and the action therein contained ratified and recommendations adopted.
- 12. Resolved, That upon the request of the Medical College Council of March 17, 1917, the Chairman of this meeting appoint a Committee to consider the question of a union of certain medical colleges and hospitals in New York City,

The Chair appointed as such committee the President and Trustees Place and J. DuPratt White.

13. Chairman Sackett of the Semi-Centennial Celebration Committee presented the printed minutes of its meetings and those of its Executive Committee since August 19, 1916.

The minutes of the meeting of the Committee of April 14, 1917, included the following recommendations:

"It was voted that the recommendation of the Executive Committee for the striking of a medal commemorative of the Semi-Centennial Celebration be approved and recommended to the Board of Trustees; that the question of the extent and manner of distribution be left for future determination; and that the Committee on Commemorative Medal be requested to report to the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the General Committee before the meeting of the Trustees on the 21st instant the probable cost of the medal.

"It was voted that the recommendation of the Executive Committee that Honorable Frank H. Hiscock, '75, Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals, be invited to deliver the Commemorative Oration on Monday afternoon, October 7th, and that President Schurman extend this invitation to Judge Hiscock in behalf of the University, be approved and recommended to the Board of Trustees.

"It was voted to recommend to the Board of Trustees that the President be asked to invite, in behalf of the University, John R. Mott, '88, to deliver the principal address in the course of the official exercises on the morning of Sunday, October 6th.

"It was voted that the recommendation of the Executive Committee that the closing social events of the celebration be a luncheon for the Alumni at noon and a dinner for the formal guests in the evening of Tuesday, October 8th be approved and recommended to the Board of Trustees.

"It was voted unanimously that the recommendation of the Executive Committee that the pageant be held in the Armory on the evening of Monday, October 7th, at an expense of \$15,200, including within that sum the engagement of Joseph Lindon Smith as Pageant Master at a compensation of \$5,000, be approved and recommended to the Board of Trustees."

"The amounts of various items of expense were discussed and informally calculated, and it was roughly estimated that, including the \$25,000 for the statue of Ezra Cornell and the \$15,200 for the pageant, the whole celebration would cost from \$60,000 to \$75,000."

"It was voted that the Chairman be authorized to present the budget to the Board of Trustees without carrying out the amounts of items other than those of the Statue of Ezra Cornell, \$25,000 and the pageant \$15,200."

It was Resolved, That all of the foregoing recommendations of the Semi-Centennial Celebration Committee be adopted, except those in regard to the proposed pageantry and commemorative medal, and that the action of the Semi-Centennial Committee in appointing special committees on Decoration, Medal, Military, Participation of Alumni, Participation of Earlier Students, Participation of Separate Colleges, Participation of Undergraduates, and Publication of the Book of Record, be approved.

14. The budget for the year 1917-18 as recommended by the Committee prior to the Commencement of the War was presented and it was *Resolved*, That the same be left with the Committee for presentation, with such modifications as may be deemed advisable, at the June meeting of the Board.

- 15. It was *Resolved*, That the report of Trustee Matthews upon the matter of additional appropriations for the expenses of the Associate Alumni for the current year and the resolution accompanying the same, be referred to the Committee on General Administration.
- 16. The Committee on the Revision of the Statutes, pursuant to the action at the November meeting of the Board, presented recommendations for certain changes, based upon suggestions made to it, and the recommendations were adopted.
- 17. Trustee Moody presented a request that the title "Adviser of Women" be changed to "Dean of Women" and that the annual appropriation to cover the salary of the office be not less than \$5,000 and moved that Article 13 of the Statutes be amended by striking out the word "Adviser" wherever the same appears and substituting therefor the word "Dean".

It was *Resolved* that further consideration of the motion be deferred until the June meeting of the Board, that Mrs. Moody be invited to present the matter at that time, and that the question be referred to the University Faculty for an expression of its opinion.

- 18. Trustee Matthews presented the report of the Committee upon the Publication of the Ten-year Book and the annual address lists, and it was *Resolved* that, in view of the present conditions, the matter be laid upon the table without prejudice to the Secretary's continuing the preparation of the Ten-year Book.
- 19. Resolved, that membership upon the Semi-Centennial Endowment Committee be open to others than members of the Board of Trustees and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to appoint a chairman of the Committee.
- 20. Whereas, the University Faculty on March 28th adopted the following resolution:
- "That the University Faculty advises that the several Faculties recommend for graduation all members of the senior class in good standing, who would normally graduate in June, and who are enrolled, or who may enroll in the land or naval forces of the state or nation, and whose services require their absence from the University, or who, after approval by a Committee of this Faculty, engage in industrial or other enterprises contributory to the efficiency or success of such forces." and

WHEREAS, degrees are in some cases a prerequisite of appointment to the public service; and

WHEREAS, the University Faculty at its meeting on April 18th informally approved the President's proposal that degrees should be conferred as soon as applied for on all seniors in good standing included in the terms of the above mentioned Faculty resolution;

Therefore Resolved, That the President be authorized to confer degrees upon seniors in good standing embraced in the terms of the above mentioned resolution at any time at which they make application for them on condition, however, that every such senior shall be recommended by his Faculty for such degree.

- 21. Upon the recommendation made at the conference of the Faculty of the College of Law with the lawyers in the Board of Trustees, it was *Resolved*, that beginning in the Fall of 1919 the University require two years of College work for admission to the College of Law.
- 22. Upon the recommendation of the Faculty of the Graduate School, it was voted to add to the advanced degrees at present conferred by Cornell University that of Master of Science.
- 23. Resolved, That in view of the large sums of money to become available for extension work in the next few years the Agricultural College Council be requested to consider and report upon the best organization of the workers in the Extension Department and the relation which they should bear to the Faculty of Agriculture as now constituted by the statutes of the University, Art. VIII, Sec. 3, Paragraph B.
- 24. Resolved, That there be freely extended to all professors, instructors and graduates of the Institute National Agronomique of France the privileges of the laboratories, libraries, and other facilities of the New York State College of Agriculture and the New York State College of Veterinary Medicine at Cornell University to the utmost extent practicable, and that they be assured of the readiness of the Trustees of this University and the Faculties of these Colleges to facilitate in whatever way may be feasible the conduct of such studies and investigations as they may desire to undertake.
- 25. Resolved, That for the purpose of increasing the food supply during the coming year the matter of the temporary use of the lands of the University, not included in the Campus and not heretofore planted to trees, be referred to Dean Mann and Superintendent Curtis with power.
- 26. The application of the Chi Chapter of Delta Gamma that, when consideration can properly be given to the assignments of lots in the vicinity of Prudence Risley Hall to organizations of women students, a lot suitable for a Chapter House may be assigned to it, was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.
- 27. A communication from Boris B. Gordon, offering a portrait of the late Trustee Boldt for \$2,500 was referred to the Committee on General Administration.
- 28. Resolved, That in view of the grave and embarrassing financial situation which the war has created for the University this Board

deems it inadvisable at the present time to increase the salaries of any professors or assistant professors.

- 29. Resolved, That a Committee consisting of one trustee appointed by the Governor, one trustee elected by the Board and three trustees elected by the Alumni, and the President be appointed by the Chair to investigate as to what can be done toward increasing salaries from the Alumni Fund. The chair appointed to this committee Trustees Matthews, R. H. Treman, Place, Edwards, and J. DuPratt White.
- 30. In view of the continued increase in the prices of food and fuel, and wages, *Resolved*, That the charge for room, laundry and board in Sage College and Prudence Risley Hall be increased to \$350 per annum, and that the rent of rooms in the residential halls for men be increased \$10 per student.
- 31. The matter of refund of tuition to students leaving the University after the Spring vacation was considered and it was

Resolved, That no such refund be authorized.

- 32. Resolved, That the Board of Trustees put upon record their great appreciation of the scientific attainments and reputation of Professor Titchener and the high services he has rendered, as a teacher and investigator, to the University, and they express the earnest hope that, in the present emergency he can find it compatible with his best interests, in spite of calls from elsewhere, to remain a member of the Faculty of Cornell University with which he has been so honorably connected for nearly a quarter of a century.
- 33. The Board of Trustees of Cornell University pledges to the President of the United States, and to Congress, to the Governor of New York State, and to the civil and military authorities of the nation and the state, the loyal and enthusiastic support of this University in facing the demands made upon them by the war, and places its resources at their command.

A letter from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees advising of the approval of the minutes of the Council meeting March 17, 1917, with the exception of the recommendation in regard to the appointment of

a Committee to consider a union of the Medical Colleges and Hospitals in New York City, which recommendation was referred to the Board of Trustees, was presented and placed on file.

Mr. Place, on behalf of the Committee appointed by the Board of Trustees, presented an informal report of the Conference held of certain hospitals and medical schools for the consideration of a plan for the development of a great medical centre in the City of New York and it was the view of the Council that the Committee should continue their conferences and that Mr. Place and Mr. White should be our representatives in the consideration of the legal questions involved.

Moved and carried that the Medical College Council make recommendations to the Board of Trustees as follows:—

- I. That the settlement of the matter of encroachment of the Loomis Laboratory upon the adjoining property owned by Mrs. Alice D. Osborn in accordance with a tentative agreement of April 23, 1917, and signed by J. Thorn Willson and Otto M. Eidlitz for Cornell University and J. Vernon Weisbrod and J. Langdon Schroeder for Mrs. Alice D. Osborn and in accordance with the letter of Mr. Mynderse Van Cleef, University Attorney, dated May 10, to Dean Polk, appropriate papers being executed to carry out the agreement, that this agreement be authorized, ratified and confirmed and an appropriation of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) be hereby made to effect such settlement.
- 2. That Doctor Benjamin Vance who has been called into the national service be given a leave of absence as of May 8, 1917, for the rest of the year and the unused portion of his year's salary be used in part to pay a substitute at a compensation to be fixed by the Dean, and that the remainder of the same be paid to Doctor Vance or, in his absence, to his mother, whose receipt the clerk is hereby authorized to accept.
- 3. That the resignation of Doctor Warren Coleman, Professor of Applied Pharmacology, be accepted to take effect at the end of the current year.
- 4. That an appropriation of \$450, be made to pay for instruction given in Clinical Medicine in Bellevue Hospital and a course in Surgical Anatomy in the College as follows:

Dear President Schurman:

I am directed by the Trustees of the Carnegie Foundation to communicate to all associated colleges and universities the following information.

At a meeting held on May 18, the Trustees considered the report on the plan of insurance and annuities, prepared by a joint Commission appointed in November, 1916. A copy of this report is enclosed. The Trustees of the Foundation took the following action.

- I. The Trustees accept the fundamental principles of a pension system as defined in the report of this commission,—that is to say, a pension system for college teachers should include the principle of the contributory pension, of cooperation between the teacher and his college, and of the creation of a reserve for each pension.
- 2. As a means of carrying out this plan the Trustees approve the combination of insurance and annuity benefits as proposed by the Commission, and accept the proposed Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association as outlined in this report as a practical and effective method of providing insurance and pension benefits for college teachers. The organization of this agency is completely ex-

plained in the Report of the President of the Foundation now about to be distributed.

- 3. The Trustees of the Foundation have asked the Carnegie Corporation of New York to cooperate with the Foundation in carrying out the recommendations of this Commission by enabling the Foundation to fulfill the reasonable expectations of teachers in the associated colleges and universities prior to November 17, 1915; by enabling the Foundation to afford some assistance during the transition period of the next twenty years toward the retiring allowances of old teachers in institutions which are not now, but may later be, associated with the Foundation; and by supplying the capital necessary to establish the Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association.
- 4. The Trustees of the Carnegie Foundation therefore notify all associated colleges and universities of this action and inform them that the privileges of teachers in the associated colleges under the present rules will not extend to those entering these institutions after the date mentioned.
- 5. Full information will be given in due time both as to the cooperation of the Carnegie Corporation and as to the conditions and benefits of the contributory system to be inaugurated. It is expected that the Insurance and Annuity Association will be incorporated and organized before the end of 1917.

This Communication is sent by direction of the Trustees of the Foundation. It is requested that the Report of the Commission be considered as a confidential paper until June 11th.

Dear President Schurman:

At the meeting of the Trustees of the Carnegie Foundation held on May 18 the following resolution was passed which the President was directed to communicate to all associated colleges and universities.

Voted: That the age of 65 shall be looked upon as a minimum, but not as a required age for the retirement of officers and teachers of the associated colleges.

I may add that this action was taken in order to correct an evident misapprehension on the part of some of the associated colleges. Some

of the associated institutions construed the naming of age 65 to mean that the Foundation advised compulsory retirement at this age. On the contrary this age was taken as a minimum and it is the opinion of many of the trustees that compulsory retirement should not come before 68 or 70. Sixty-five is only one year above the compulsory age of retirement in the army. Teachers generally feel that a compulsory retirement at this age would remove many men at a time when they were most capable of service. The Trustees have directed that this information be sent to all associated colleges in order to make clear that the age of 65 was originally named only as a minimum age of retirement.

- 9. Resolved, That the recommendation of the Carnegie Foundation in regard to the age for the retiring of officers and teachers be referred to the members of the former Committee on the Revision of Statutes, and that they be requested to report to the Board of Trustees at its forthcoming meeting.
- 10. The application of Professor H. J. Davenport to be admitted to the benefits of the Wm. H. Sage Pension Fund was received and laid over until a future meeting on account of the consideration of changes in the administration of the Carnegie Pension Fund which may make advisable changes in the rules governing the University Fund.
- 11. Resolved, That Professor Geo. F. Atkinson be relieved from his duties of teaching and administration for the next two years in order that he may devote his time to research and to the publication of his accumulated materials, and that the Trustees express their regret at their inability in the present emergency to render any further assistance in this work.
- 12. The President reported that the University had been designated by the War Department as the location for a United States School of Military Areonautics, and that, pursuant to correspondence with the War Department, he had authorized the following appointments:
- Capt. G. M. James, at a salary of \$200, per month, beginning May 21st, 1917.
- W. L. R. Saunders at the rate of \$50 per month and subsistence, beginning May 21st, 1917.
- W. F. Bull at the rate of \$50 per month and subsistence, beginning May 24, 1917.

Geo. A. Benton, Jr., at the rate of \$50 per month and subsistence, beginning June 4, 1917.

And the appointment of a clerk at the rate of not to exceed \$75 per month.

Also that he had authorized the Treasurer to make advances pursuant to the above and for necessary incidental expenses of the school, it being understood that the Federal Government will reimburse the University for money so advanced.

Resolved, That the foregoing action of the President be approved.

13. Upon the recommendation of the University Faculty the following rules regarding delinquencies and penalties imposed for same were adopted to take effect at the beginning of the academic year 1917-18, with the proviso that this action will be without prejudice to existing rules relating to the matters involved.

Rules Regarding Delinquencies, and Penalties imposed for the Same.

(Adopted by the University Faculty, April 18, 1917.)

- I. A student desiring to register after the close of Registration Day shall first pay a fee of \$5.
- II. A student desiring to file his registration of studies after the date set by his college for filing the same shall pay a fee of \$2.
- III. A student desiring to take a term examination or other test for the removal of a condition (including the making up of a mark of "absent" or "incomplete") shall first pay a fee of \$2, for each condition or delinquency which he desires to remove.
- IV. A student desiring to continue his University work after having been absent without excuse from his Dean from any class or exercise occurring during the first day immediately preceding or following the Thanksgiving, the Christmas or the Easter Recess, shall pay a fee of \$2 for each day on which an absence occurred.
- V. For reasons satisfactory to the Comptroller and the Registrar any of the fees mentioned in Nos. I, II, III, and IV may be waived in any individual case upon the recommendation of the Dean of the College concerned, if in his jndgment the student's failure to comply with the regulations was due to ill health or other reasons beyond his control.
- VI. Nothing in the above regulations shall be construed as preventing any college from imposing additional academic penalties or regulations.
- VII. That the wording of a statement covering the fees and regulations which may be adopted and the methods for enforcing the same be referred with power to a committee consisting of the Secretary of the University Faculty, the Treasurer and the Registrar.

- 14. Appointments for the remainder of the academic year except as otherwise stated were made as follows:
- P. W. Townsend to be Assistant in Ancient History, from May 1st, with salary at the rate of \$350 per annum and free tuition, vice J. G. Schurman, Jr., resigned.

- 16. Resolved, That as A. E. McKinney, assistant in Chemistry has, since May 16th, been working on part time only, the rest of his time being given to agricultural chemistry, he be paid at the rate of \$125 per annum from that date.
- 17. Professor Anderson and others members of the Chemistry Staff who are engaged in Government work were relieved of their teaching duties, with the exception of lectures and general oversight of the courses in their charge for the remainder of the present term.
- 18. Leave of absence without prejudice to salary was granted to G. P. Upton from May 28 to June 7 to enable him to join the Cornell Biological Expedition in the South; and to H. W. VanLoon, from June 6 to June 27 to enable him to catch steamer to Holland.

- 19. Messrs. Haskins & Sells, certified accountants, were appointed to make the annual audit of the accounts of the Comptroller and Treasurer.
- 20. \$600 was appropriated from the moneys received from the Morse Hall fire insurance for completing the necessary repairs to Morse Hall.
- 21. A transfer of \$2,000 from unexpended salaries appropriated to the Dept. of Buildings and Grounds to the maintenance appropriations of the Department was authorized.
- 22. The matter of the sale of surplus electric power of the University during the summer was referred to the Comptroller and to the University Attorney with power.
- 23. Resolved, That without committing the Trustees to the approval of specific items, \$208.92 be added to the amount appropriated for the expense of the Associate Alumni for the current year, in order to meet current obligations of the Association.
- 24. Resolved, That the Trustees of Cornell University respectfully protest against the policy, unwise in itself and violative of established national practice, of taxing bequests, legacies or gifts for educational, philanthropic, charitable or religious purposes, and that they urge upon Congress, and also upon the Finance Committee of the Senate and Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives, the adoption of an amendment to the existing law which shall exempt educational, philanthropic and religious bequests and gifts from Federal taxation, as in all previous legislation of our country.
- 25. Whereas, The Comptroller of the State of New York requires the Treasurer of Cornell University as custodiau of the moneys appropriated from time to time by the Legislature of the State of New York for the New York State College of Agriculture and the State Veterinary College at Cornell University, to furnish a surety bond to the people of the State of New York in the penal sum of \$75,000, to secure the faithful discharge of his duties as such Treasurer and the proper accounting for and paying over of such moneys or appropriations received by him as such Treasurer in accordance with the law, and

WHEREAS, The form of bond supplied and required by the Comptroller calls for the personal bond of Charles D. Bostwick, the Treasurer, and

WHEREAS, The said fund received by said Treasurer is distributed and paid out by him as directed by the Trustees of Cornell University,

Therefore Be It *Resolved*, That Cornell University request said Charles D. Bostwick its Treasurer to procure and furnish to the people of the State of New York a surety bond in the sum of \$75,000 as required by the Comptroller, and further

Be it *Resolved*, That Cornell University hereby agrees to indemnify and save harmless said Chas. D. Bostwick or his executors or administrators from any loss or damage resulting from the giving of said bond or any connection therewith except as to any loss caused by his default or by action not authorized by the Board of Trustees.

My dear Mr. Bostwick:

Complying with your request we have made up a table similar to the one appearing on page 179 of the proceedings of the Board of Trustees for 1915-16.

As in past tables the actual hours reported at the end of the first term have been used and for the second term figures the actual registration on April 1st as near as could be given by the colleges concerned. This year there has been much confusion and perhaps the tables will show some slight discrepancies.

Agricultural Chemistry is treated as an Agricultural subject and not included in the Department of Chemistry. As graduate students are not reported by hours they are not tabulated but where a student is registered, for example, as 1917 Arts and Graduate the hours are included in the College of Arts and Sciences. This office has no record of Medicine hours except those in the division at Ithaca and the tables, therefore, do not include Medicine in New York City.

VETERINARY COLLEGE COUNCIL.

JUNE 25, 1917.

Present—Chairman Schurman, Trustees T. B. Wilson, Miller, J. DuPratt White, Matthews and Newman; Dean Moore, Faculty Representative Fish, Comptroller Williams.

Regrets were presented from Trustees Sessions, Horace White and C. S. Wilson, and their absences excused.

Action was taken as follows:

The matter of the form of reports to the State Comptroller of the Income and Revolving Funds of the College was referred to Comptroller Williams and Dean Moore.

- A. The following appointments for the year 1917–18 were recommended:
- (1) That Dr. E. M. Pickens be made Professor in Diagnosis at a salary of \$2,500.
- (2) That Dr. S. A. Goldberg be made Assistant Professor of Pathology at a salary of \$1,800.
- (3) That Dr. W. A. Hagan be made Instructor in Pathology and Bacteriology at a salary of \$1,800.
- (4) That Dr. W. E. Muldoon be made Assistant Professor of Materia Medica and Small Animal Clinic at a salary of \$1,500.
- (5) That Dr. J. N. Frost be made Professor of Surgery at a salary of \$2,750.
- (6) That Dr. C. M. Carpenter be appointed Instructor in Obstetrics, Dr. W. D. Way, Instructor in Medicine, and Dr. E. B. Hopper Instructor in Surgery at a salary of \$800 each.
- (7) That a sum not to exceed \$700 be made available from the income for necessary assistants for work during the summer.
 - B. The following resolutions were recommended:
- (1) That Professor S. H. Burnett be given a leave of absence for one year without pay.
- (2) That in accordance with a resolution adopted June 12, 1912, the Veterinary College be represented at the American Veterinary Medical Association in Kansas City in August by three representatives at a cost not to exceed \$300.
- (3) That non-resident lecturers be engaged at a cost not to exceed a total of \$125.
- (4) That in order to keep the Farriery open during the summer Professor Asmus be allowed \$75 a month for the summer vacation to be taken out of the earnings of the department.
 - (5) That Mr. W. A. Billings, assistant in diagnosis be allowed \$60 146

per month for three months during the summer vacation to be paid from the revolving fund of the Department of Pathology and Bacteriology.

- (6) That owing to the uncertainty in the number of students next year the positions of assistants provided for in the appropriation bill, in departments where they will not be especially needed if the registration of students is small, be left vacant until the necessity for filling them occurs. If, however, the work requires the employment of more assistants, they may be appointed on the recommendation of the Dean and the approval of the President.
- C. It is recommended that the following appropriations be made from the income.

The same was approved and authority given to the Comptroller to execute same on behalf of the University and affix thereto the University's corporate seal.
- 14. Referring to the action of this Committee at its meeting June 6, 1917, relieving Prof. George F. Atkinson of teaching duties, it was Resolved, That he be given the help of the departmental stenographer for half time, until January 1, 1918; that \$200 of the department appropriation unexpended be re-appropriated for his use, and that it is understood that the apparatus etc. in the laboratery which he has been using in the prosecution of this work be available for his use as heretofore.
- 15. The action of the President in designating First Sergeant Theodore Nagel, U. S.  - 12. Resolved, That the following be appointed, without salary:
- J. E. Trevor to be Professor of Thermodynamics for one year, effective July 1, 1917.
- G. S. Moler to be Professor of Physics, *Emeritus*, effective June 27, 1917.
- R. C. Carpenter to be Professor of Experimental Engineering, *Emeritus*, effective June 27, 1917.
- 13. The President nominated Acting Dean Albert R. Mann, to be Dean of the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University, and presented the formal action of the Faculty of the College of Agriculture and the informal action of the Agricultural College Council indorsing the nomination, and, by ballot, Dean Mann was unanimously elected to the position at a salary of \$6,000 per anum, election to take effect July 1, 1917.
- 14. The minutes of the meeting of the Agricultural College Council of June 25, 1917, were read and approved and action therein contained ratified, the recommendations adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.
- 15. The minutes of the Veterinary College Council of June 25, 1917, were read and approved and action therein contained ratified, the recommendations adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.
 - 16. Trustee Moody presented the following:
- If it seems wise to the Presideut and to the Board of Trustees to defer action about appointing a suitable Adviser of Women for

another year, because of the great burden under which the University is laboring in the national crisis, the Cornell Alumnae, being anxious to support the general cause of the University by every possible means, will rest contented under another year's temporary adjustment concerning the Adviser or Dean of Women. They would like, however to make an earnest appeal to the Board, in postponing this appointment, that when the time comes for such appointment to be made, the Alumnae be again invited to conference with the President and that in no case a woman should be appointed who is not a recognized educator of the highest type, a woman experienced in every way in administrative work, and one who is acceptable to the Cornell Alumnae.

I will ask to have this request received, spread on the records and published with them.

- 17. There was presented to the Board a printed report of the University Faculty to the Board of Trustees in regard to the office of Adviser of Women.
- 18. Dr. Edith H. Matzke was appointed Adviser of Women for one year from the expiration of her present appointment at a total salary, inclusive of that received as medical examiner and medical adviser, of \$3,000.
- 19. Chairman Sackett of the Committee on the Semi-Centennial Celebration Committee reported that, in view of existing conditions, the Committee had decided to abandon the project of the pageant in connection with the celebration. This action was approved.
- 20. It was resolved that the definite location of the proposed statue of Ezra Cornell be referred, with power, to the special committee of the Semi-Centennial Celebration Committee, on the statue with the University Committee on Buildings and Grounds and Trustee C. E. Cornell.
- 21. On the recommendation of the Cornellian Council, it was voted to transfer \$54,000 from the Alumni Fund to the general fund of the University.
- 22. The following was presented, ordered printed in the minutes and the recommendations therein contained adopted.

ITHACA, N. Y., JUNE 25, 1917.

To the Trustees of Cornell University:

The undersigned were appointed members of a special committee of the Trustees at the spring meeting "to investigate as to what can be done toward increasing salaries from the Alumni Fund" and beg leave to report:

The character of the debate at the time this committee was appointed did not indicate that there was any purpose of the Board

to increase salaries of the teaching staff of Cornell University from the University's permanent funds, because there is no money available for any such increase. Nor did it indicate any intention to give definite or permanent salary increases from the Alumni Fund. It did indicate that owing to the burdensome increase in the cost of living many of the lower salaried members of the teaching staff were facing a condition of financial distress. It also showed that the members of the Board believed that if this embarrassment could be relieved temporarily by a substantial gift, or bonus, or contribution, this contribution to come from the Alumni Fund, provided it was practicable and to be regarded solely as a temporary recognition of what has long been the desire of this Board, namely, to give fitting salaries for faithful work by the teaching staff, the plan would be altogether commendable. No step along this line has been taken hitherto because this Board has felt the necessity of waiting until the condition of the Alumni Fund warranted taking suitable action.

Your committee has information that the total contributions to the Alumni Fund for the current fiscal year will amount to more than \$50,000. If, following our custom, one half of this round sum, say \$25,000, should be set aside to discharge part of the indebtedness on Founders Hall, there would still be \$25,000 in round numbers available for salary gifts in addition to the \$13,000 remaining over unexpended from last year and still available for any emergency to which it might be applied.

If therefore a sum of about \$20,000 should be used from the Alumni Fund to help relieve the distress of the ill-paid teachers of the University, and if the sum of \$25,000 should be set aside to pay part of the indebtedness on Founders Hall, there would be still in the treasury of the University, counting the \$13,000 unexpended last year, not less than \$20,000 unexpended and awaiting the disposition of this board. That is to say, we can pay off \$25,000 on Founders Hall this year, can make salary gifts to teachers amounting to \$20,000 and yet have more than \$20,000 of the Alumni Fund remaining as a balance and unexpended, available for any University emergencies.

Your Committee therefore reports that it has considered this matter of so-called "increasing salaries" solely from the stand-point of temporary contributions, supplementary to salaries already provided for for the present fiscal year. It has reached the conclusion that it would be wise and proper to make Emergency Contributions to all members of the teaching staff of and including the grade of Assistant Professor down. According to the figures submitted to us by the Treasurer of the University this means a substantial gift to 189 members of the teaching staff divided as follows: 70 Assistant Professors of all grades; 109 Instructors of all grades; 3 Shop Foremen; 7 Shop Assistants. The committee also decided that the contributions should

be made without personal discrimination, except that it was felt that, being contributions solely, those members of the staff who were married and therefore had others dependent upon them, or who might be widowers and had children dependent upon them, should receive a larger bonus than those who were not married.

The Committee therefore investigated six plans of distributing a round sum of \$20,000 and decided upon a plan which will mean an expenditure of \$18,500. The plan is this:

- I. That to all Assistant Professors who are married numbering 52, a gift of \$150 each be made. Of these professors, 29 are now receiving \$1,500 a year; 1, \$1,800; 22, \$2,000. The aggregate of their present salaries is \$89,300. The award to them will be \$7,800.
- 2. That to all Assistant Professors who are not married, numbering 18, a gift of \$100 each be made. Of these professors 10 are receiving \$1,500 a year and 8, \$2,000. The aggregate of their present salaries is \$31,000. The award to them will be \$1,800.
- 3. That to all Instructors, Shop Foremen and Shop Assistants who are married, numbering 59, a gift of \$100 each be made. Of these instructors 2 are receiving \$800 a year, 26 are receiving \$1,100 and 7 Shop Assistants are receiving \$800. The aggregate of their present salaries is \$61,900. The award to them will be \$5,900.
- 4. That to all Instructors and Shop Foremen not married (there are no Shop Assistants who are not married) numbering 60, a gift of \$50 each be made. Of these instructors 20 are receiving \$800 a year; 31, \$1,000; 7, \$1,200. Of the shop foremen 2 are receiving \$1,100. The aggregate of their present salaries is \$57,600. The award to them will be \$3,000.

The total aggregate to 189 teachers is \$18,500, practically \$100 to a teacher on the average.

Your committee therefore offers the following:

WHEREAS it has been the earnest desire of the Trustees of Cornell University for a long time to relieve the financial requirements of many of its teaching staff and

WHEREAS the condition of the Alumni Fund has now reached a situation where this object may be accomplished to some degree.

Be it Resolved, That an Emergency Contribution of \$150 each be made at the end of the present fiscal year to all Assistant Professors who are married in the University at Ithaca except the State Colleges; that a similar contribution of \$100 each be made to all Assistant Professors who are not married; that a similar contribution of \$100 each be made to all Instructors, Shop Foremen and Shop Assistants who are married; that a similar contribution of \$50 each be made to all Instructors, Shop Foremen and Shop Assistants who are not married.

Resolved, That these contributions shall be made out of the receipts

for the Alumni Fund and that it shall be understood that they are temporary and not binding in any way as salary increases for the future.

- 23. Resolved, That of the moneys received from the Cornellian Council, \$25,000 be appropriated toward meeting the cost of Founders-Hall.
- 24. The following was presented by Trustee Matthews, ordered printed, and laid upon the table until the Fall meeting of the Board-

Resolved, That in accordance with its policy embodied in the resolution of the Board of Trustees adopted April 19, 1903, whereby the University pledged itself to duplicate out of its own funds all residential halls received as unrestricted gifts up to the aggregate limit of \$500,000 it being understood that such halls be of a plain, substantial character, fireproof, and as beautiful as compatible with simplicity and economy, the University hereby pledges itself to furnish one-half of the cost of construction of a unit of the New Residential Halls, in the event that the members of any individual class raises the other half, said unit to constitute the class memorial of the Class contributing one-half of the cost of construction thereof, and

Be It Further Resolved, That in consideration of the undertaking on the part of any class or classes to raise sufficient funds for one of the dormitory units, and having these funds tendered to the University through the Alumni Fund, the University pledges itself to set aside at the end of each year for five years in a special fund, all contributions to the Alumni Fund received from the members of the class or classes carrying out this plan, which at the end of five years or sooner; shall be used toward the cost of construction of the building, and

Be it Further Resolved, That the University pledges itself to goforward with the construction of this building as soon as sufficient funds have been pledged by the class or classes which in the judgment of the Comptroller of the University will insure a net income in five years of one-half of the cost of said dormitory, provided, however, that the University does not pledge itself to construct any buildings at a time when the cost of building construction is above normal.

25. The special committee to consider the matter of change in the statutes to cover the retiring age of professors, reported in favor of

the principle that a professor should be retired on his own request at the beginning of any fiscal year after he has reached the age of sixty-five, and should be retired without such request at the beginning of the fiscal year after he has reached the age of sixty-eight, subject to the right of the University to continue the services of any professor in the performance of all or part of his former professorial duties, for one or more years thereafter under such title and at such compensation as may be agreed upon and the matter was referred back to the Committee to recommend the necessary changes in the statutes to embody the same.

26. On the recommendation of the University Faculty that portion of Section 2, of Art. I, of the Statutes with respect to degrees in the College of Architecture was amended to read as follows:

"In the College of Architecture, the degree of Bachelor of Architecture (B. Arch.) or of Bachelor of Science (Architecture) (B.S. (Arch.))"

27. The special committee appointed at the April meeting to consider the question of the union of certain medical colleges and hospitals in New York City, presented the following report which was approved.

TO THE CORNELL UNIVERSITY MEDICAL COLLEGE COUNCIL:

The undersigned beg to report as follows:

At a meeting of the Council on May 19, 1917, the following resolution was adopted:

"Mr. Place, on behalf of the Committee appointed by the Board of Trustees, presented an informal report of the Conference held of certain hospitals and medical schools for the consideration ot a plan for the development of a great medical centre in the City of New York and it was the view of the Council that the Committee should continue their conferences and that Mr. Place and Mr. White should be our representatives in the consideration of the legal questions involved."

Since that date there has been received a report of ex-Judge George L. Ingraham, Mr. Frederic R. Coudert and Mr. Newton Carlton, Committee on legal affairs of Columbia University, in relation to the proposed merger of the Medical Schools of Columbia University and Cornell University, dated June 5, 1917.

That report is attached hereto, and it may be noted that that Committee, after referring to the conference of the representatives of the hospitals and of the two universities, stated its understanding of the precise present situation as follows:

"The representatives of the two hospitals stated that there was no obstacle, legal or otherwise, to the complete corporate merger of the two hospitals into a single institution, but that their powers to go on

with the merger were at the moment conditioned upon the willingness and the ability of the two medical schools similarly to merge or unite."

This report concludes as follows:

"Your Committee, therefore, reports that in its opinion there are insurmountable legal difficulties in the merger of the medical department of Columbia University with the medical department of any other University or institution, except that the new institution becomes a medical department in Columbia University."

The report was accepted and its conclusions adopted by the Trustees of Columbia University.

The making of this report, so far as the legal situation is concerned, leaves very little for your Committee to do with respect to the legal questions involved.

We must accept the conclusions of this report and its acceptance by the Trustees of Columbia University as conclusive. It may be well, however, to state the situation so far as the Medical College of Cornell University is concerned.

In 1898, by Chapter 223 of that year, Section 4 of Chapter 585 of the Laws of 1865, which constitutes the charter of Cornell University, was amended by inserting the following words: "Said university is authorized to establish faculties, departments and branches, and carry on its work at any place or places in the state, and to confer any and all literary, scientific, technical and professional degrees, and in testimony thereof award certificates and diplomas."

The Medical College was established pursuant to that authority given by that amendment. The only other pertinent matter appears in the minutes of the Executive Committee of the Trustees of Cornell University, held November 18, 1913, when the following action was taken

"I. The committee appointed to receive the securities to form the endowment of the Cornell University Medical College in New York City, reported the receipt of securities as hereinafter listed, whereupon the following was adopted:

WHEREAS, Oliver H. Payne, of the City of New York, has transferred to Cornell University Medical College in New York City, all those certain securities enumerated and described, and upon the trusts set forth and expressed, in the letter of which the following is a copy:

NOVEMBER 12th, 1913, 852 Fifth Ave.

Hon. Jacob G. Schurman,
President Cornell University.

DEAR SIR :-

I desire to arrange for the permanent endowment of the Cornell University Medical College in the City of New York by the creation of a fund the income of which shall be applied to its maintenance and operation.

For the purpose of constituting such a fund, I have selected the following bonds, which I regard as conservative and well secured investments, viz.:

Making a total par value of ______\$4,350,000 and producing an annual income of \$201,250.

These securities I hereby give to Cornell University upon trust, to hold the same perpetually as a separate and distinct fund, to invest the same and keep the same invested, with power to alter and vary all investments whether original or subsequent, and to collect and receive the income thereof, and to [apply such income, or so much thereof as shall from time to time be necessary, to the payment of the expense of the maintenance and operation of Cornell University Medical College in the City of New York.

Resolved, That Cornell University hereby accepts said securities for the purposes and upon the trusts set forth and expressed in said letter."

The legal difficulties with respect to the proposition to merge or unite the two Medical Schools have been apparent from the first. The representatives of the two hospitals state that there is no obstacle, legal or otherwise, to a complete corporate merger of the two. This may well be so, for the reason that it is proposed to merge the entire corporate bodies. On the other hand, of course, it is not suggested that the other two corporate bodies, Cornell University and Columbia University, be merged. The proposition or suggestion relates only to the Medical Colleges of each, and those colleges are simply departments of the Universities themselves. There is, therefore, in the case of the two Medical Schools, no two corporations which can be merged.

The approval and consent of Col. Payne, the benefactor of the Cornell University Medical College, being obtained, Cornell University would have much greater freedom of action than Columbia University possesses, in view of the report of its Committee on Legal Affairs. But, as indicated above, it would seem conclusive, if the Medical College of Columbia University cannot merge or unite with the Medical College of Cornell University, that is an end of that suggestion.

The next question would seem to be as to whether the two hospitals would modify the condition stated by their representatives that their willingness that the merger of the two hospitals depended "upon the willingness and the ability of the two medical schools similarly to merge or unite." The willingness of the representatives of the two hospitals to modify that condition may, however, depend upon whether any of the other plans heretofore or which may be suggested of co-operation by the four institutions for the purpose of creating a great medical center could be put in practicable and acceptable form.

- 31. The application of Librarian Austen for leave of absence from the end of the first semester 1917-18 until the first of June 1918, was received and action thereon deferred.
- 32. Resolved, That the appointments of wardens in the Residential Halls for Women for the year 1917-18 be referred to the President with power.
- 33. The President presented a copy of the report of the War Department inspection of the Military Department of Cornell University made May 4th and 5th, 1917, which was read and placed on file.
- 34. The report of the University Faculty upon the matter of the proposed reduction in the number of the undergraduate scholarships was presented, ordered printed and copies sent to members of the Board and action thereon deferred.

- 35. A resolution was introduced to the effect that members of the Extension Service of the College of Agriculture, who were regarded as members of the University Faculty prior to the amendment of the Statutes be continued in membership on that Faculty, and on motion the matter was referred to the Committee on General Administration to report its recommendation.
- 36. The following budget for the expenses of the Cornellian Council for the year 1917–18, payable from the funds collected by the Council was approved:
