## CORNELLIAN COUNCIL

### Members Named to Represent Nine Earlier Classes.

The Board of Trustees of the University has appointed the following men to represent their respective classes on the Cornellian Council:

These appointments were made in accordance with the decision of the Council to increase the membership from forty to fifty. As originally constituted, the Council consisted of a representative of each of the thirty classes last graduated and ten members at large. It was thought better to have forty classes represented. The original appointments were made by the Board of Trustees, and the Board was asked by the Council to name the additional new members. The class of 1909 has also chosen a representative.

George N. Lauman, of Ithaca, has been appointed to the Council as the representative of the class of 1907 in place of Jervis Langdon, resigned.

### The Late Louis Dyer.

Theodore Stanton '76 writes from England in a private letter to a friend in Ithaca:

"I have been spending August in Oxford and have often been reminded of the late Louis Dyer, who, it will be remembered at Ithaca, filled at Cornell the chair of Greek for a year, back in the eighties or nineties. Though a graduate of Harvard, Dyer closely identified himself

with Oxford, and was, if I am not mistaken, a fellow of Balliol College. He was suddenly carried off last summer, regretted by all who knew him.

"The other afternoon, I was taking tea with an undergraduate in his study in Beaumont Cottage, just off of St. John's street, when I learned that I was sitting in the very room once occupied by Louis Dyer when an undergraduate at Oxford. A few moments later, came in a tutor of St. John's College who knew Louis Dyer very well and who was high in his praise. Starting off for a stroll after the tea, I happened to pass up Banbury Road, when Louis Dyer's pretty house was pointed out to me at No. 68, where he lived so pleasantly with his cultivated wife, a sister of Frederick Macmillan, the publisher. She accompanied her husband to Ithaca, where her musical talent was much appreciated. But it was the next day, when I wandered into Balliol College, that I had the most touching reminder of Louis Dyer's sojourn in this delightful educational center. In the passage-way leading from the quadrangle to the pretty garden is a bronze tablet to his memory. He had been dead but a few months, when it was placed on the wall, a signal proof of the love and esteem felt for him here. The text of this tablet runs as follows:

"In memoriam Ludovici Dyer natus Americani, ingenio vere Oxoniensis, primam et alteram patriam pari pietate amplexi, qui musarum amore et erga suos benevolentia insignis nullum laborem defugit nulli non causae quietae cum industria inservivit, si modo doctrinae et litteris prodesse et gentium quarum consuetudinem atque amicitiam communitate studiorum confirmare posset, hunc lapidem (quod esset vitae ut non mali ignarae ita ceterorum utilitati deditae testimonium) posuerunt multis ex amicis Balliolenses. Obiit XXo die Jul. MCMVIII Anno Aetatis LVII."

## THE NEW CLUBHOUSE.

### New York Club Expects to Be Housed Soon After October 1.

Soon after the first of October, it is expected now, the Cornell University Club of New York will be housed in its new home at Park avenue and East Thirty-eighth street. It will vacate the house at 58 West Forty-fifth street about the end of this month. For several weeks the club will be homeless except for such hospitality as may be offered by other clubs, but the members will bear their deprivation with fortitude in anticipation of the commodious and beautiful clubhouse they are to have.

The structural alterations to the new house, which were fully described in the last number of the News, are nearing completion and the painters and decorators are beginning work. The contracts for furnishings are now being let. The selections that have already been made show that the house will be richly and tastefully furnished.

Already many Cornellians scattered throughout the country have become non-resident members of the club. The better to accommodate these non-resident members, the club has decided to reserve a considerable number of its sleeping rooms for them. Ultimately, if the demand for transient rooms be great enough, all the sleeping apartments will be reserved for the non-residents.

Members of the class of 1909 have contributed to date about \$28,500 for the class's contribution to the Alumni Fund. This assures an annual income from this class alone for university purposes of about \$1,425, the plan adopted by the class being the payment of interest at five per cent. on sums subscribed. The principal sum is not payable except at the option of the giver.

### THE SUMMER SESSION.

Total Attendance Was 889—Statement by Director Bristol.

[The following account of the work of the Summer Session of the University was prepared for the ALUMNI NEWS by Director George P. Bristol.—Editor.]

During the Summer Session which has just come to a close, the total number of students enrolled was 889. Last year there were 839; in 1907, 755; and in 1906, 642. Forty-three states and 16 foreign countries were represented this year. By classification the students may be grouped in the following way: Regular un-

dergraduates at Cornell, 375; former students of the University, 116; graduates of the University, 22; graduates of other colleges, 141; undergraduates from other colleges, 62. The number of graduates of Cornell returning for work in the Summer Session is small and has not increased during the last six years. I am not sure of the reason for this, but think that one cause at least is the comparatively small number of our graduates who enter the field of education as a permanent profession. I wish that the teaching profession, especially in public schools, might be more largely represented by Cornell graduates than it is at present. The number of graduates of other colleges coming here for work in the summer has been steadily increasing and is, I think, good evidence

of the value of the work we offer. Of the number of undergraduates present this summer a smaller percent. than before is made up of men who have failed. While there is every reason to offer men who have failed for other reasons than idleness an opportunity to make up their work, we try to keep constantly in mind the undesirability of holding out to any of our students the idea that the Summer Session affords an opportunity to make up for idleness and carelessness during the regular academic year.

There have been enrolled this summer 331 persons engaged in teaching. This is the largest number we

certain lines of instruction for teachers to have men at the head of the work who are facing constantly the actual problems which these teachers meet, and who are perfectly familiar with the conditions under which teaching in schools must be done.

The nature and scope of the work given this summer have not differed materially from that of last year. There have been extensions of courses given in English and in Chemistry so as to include more work of an advanced nature, and the response on the part of people desiring such work has been immediate and gratifying. We have further enlarged and systematized our work in the important line of Industrial Education. This is a comparatively new field which public school systems are taking up rapidly, and with much interest and zeal. Superintendents and commissioners are generally looking to Cornell to furnish competent teachers for this work, and we have been making a good contribution through the work of our Summer Session. This will continue to be an important feature of instruction in the future.

Cornell is particularly fortunate by reason of her situation in the amount and variety of out-of-door work which can be offered to students in the summer. For Geography and Geology, for Botany and Zoology the material within easy reach of the University is not surpassed anywhere. These advantages are becoming well known throughout the country, and students come from a wide range of territory to obtain them. One enthusiastic student said that one excursion alone was worth his coming from Minnesota. The illustration shows a class in Geography on its excursion to Watkins Glen. In addition to the regular classroom work an unusually fine series of evening lectures has been given. Members of the University faculty have been generous in giving their services for this purpose. In this way we have had entertaining and instructive lectures in several of the great fields of knowledge. In physics, Chemistry and Biology there has been opportunity to observe in the il-

have ever had, and is double the number of six years ago. Of these 40 are members of college faculties, 15 are teachers in normal schools, 129 in high schools, 131 in grammar schools and 11 come from private institutions. The presence here of this large number of teachers is in many ways of great advantage to the University, and the University is performing also a valuable duty to the cause of education in extending to them the opportunities thus afforded.

These students have been instructed by a faculty of 79 members, 42 of professorial rank. Sixty-two of the number are regular members of the teaching staff of Cornell, and 17 come from other institutions, both universities and high schools. We have found it a great advantage in

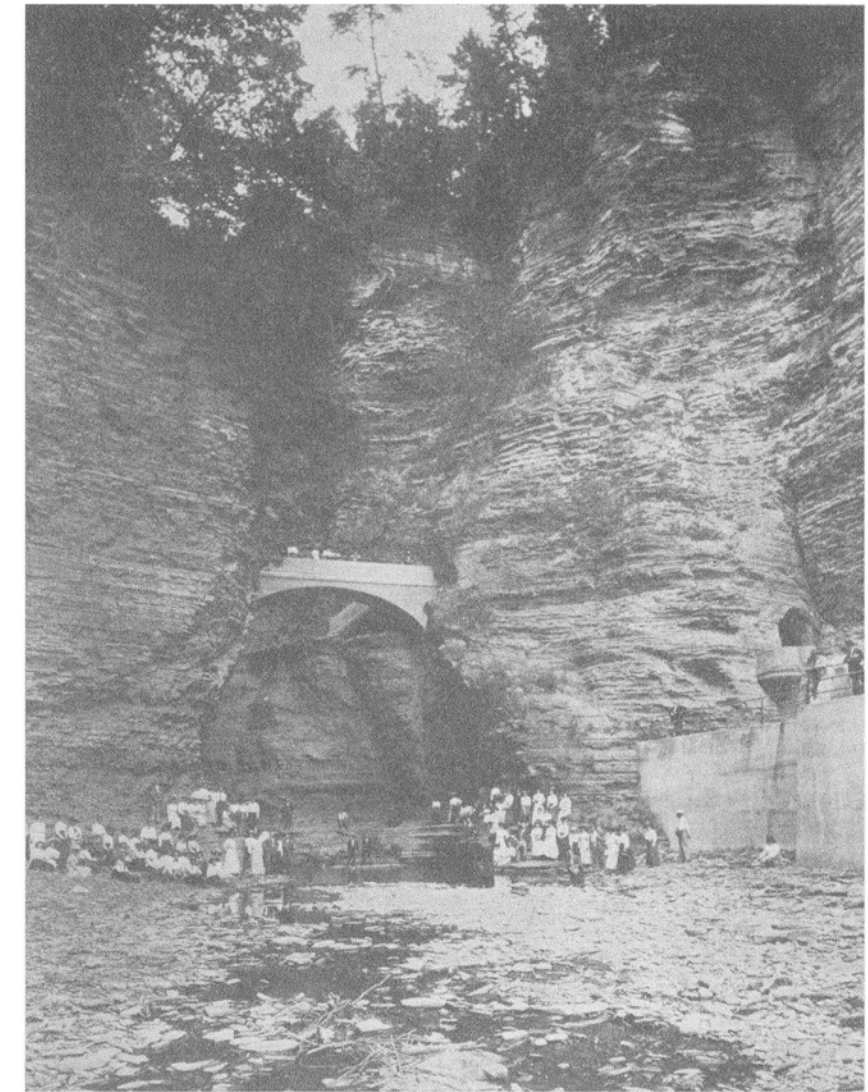
illustrated lectures the fine apparatus for illustrating the work, no less than the skilled methods of presentation of a university professor. Other lectures of most instructive and entertaining character were given by Mr. Louis A. Fuertes and Mr. Frank M. Chapman on topics connected with the study of birds. Some of these evening addresses were given before department conferences, where students and instructors met, sometimes for discussion and sometimes to listen to an address. One address given by President White was, as always, most interesting and instructive. The concluding sentences were in the nature of a personal address to the members of the Summer Session. Requests were made for a more permanent record of these words than was afforded by the recollection of the audience. They were, therefore, printed by Dr. White's kind consent, and a copy was placed in the hands of each member of the Summer Session. I think no better statement of the real spirit of a University has been made. Every Cornell alumnus must be proud of this embodiment of our chosen ideal and if Cornellians can feel that the Summer Session is endeavoring to live up to this spirit and to do what it can to increase and extend it, then I am sure they will be satisfied that the work is worthy of the University and deserves hearty support and encouragement.

**President White's Words.**

[The following was the conclusion of a lecture on "The Statesmanship of Bismarck," given before the Summer Session by President White on July 13:]

Something less than a year since I passed a day amid my old haunts on the shore of the German Ocean and visited Friedrichsruhe, the second of the two great estates given Bismarck in gratitude for his services to his country.

There it was that he had passed the happiest years of his latter life. In those broad forests I trod his favorite paths, rested in his accustomed seats, looked forth over the prospects which he had most enjoyed. In the old, hospitable mansion I lingered in the room where he died, all things in it remaining as at his death hour; sat in his work

room, at his table, which remained as he left it, among the books upon it which he had last read being one upon New York society. In the rooms where he was wont to lavish hospitality I talked with his grandson, the heir to his title, a bright boy of twelve years, and he seemed to welcome kindly my hope expressed to him that he would bear worthily his great name. Noteworthy were the manifold tokens of love and gratitude from the fellow citizens of the great Chancellor, among them a striking copy of the picture representing him standing before the Emperor William the First, in the sumptuous hall of Louis

the Fourteenth at Versailles, and announcing to the world the German Empire.

But one thing remained, of deeper interest than all else. Hard by, in a chapel of plain hewn stone, was his tomb;—a single block of granite above it, bearing the simple words which he had ordered placed upon it: "Prince Bismarck—a faithful servant of Kaiser William the First." Significant of much is it that no mention is made of the two succeeding Emperors whom he served. But of far deeper significance is the inscription over the adjacent altar. In letters of gold it gives Bismarck's favorite text,—

that which Schleiermacher placed in his hands at his confirmation in his boyhood,—words of St. Paul to the Colossians: "Do it heartily as to the Lord and not unto men."

There is the key to Bismarck's character,—without which no man can understand him. Faults he had—and great faults;—errors he committed—and great errors;—but at the foundation of the whole man was his loyalty to duty, and this was enforced by his unconquerable will. This it was which gave him that success which astonished the world,—which made him the greatest German since Luther, and one of the greatest men who ever lived.

My friends, you are entering life, I am leaving it. Let me tell you that his key to success is yours. I have seen sixty successive generations of students graduated at American colleges and universities, forty-two of them here at Cornell. I have watched their after careers. Some who seemed likely to succeed have failed; some who seemed likely to fail have made successes. And it has become clear to me that the great secret of all success worth having is character;—sound, solid, truthful, wholesome character—based upon a sense of duty and enforced by a strong will. Without this you will have no success worth having. With this all the success worth having is sure.

#### A Growing Cornell Center.

The Cornell University Association of Seattle has published a directory of Seattle and Tacoma Cornellians. The list contains 108 names, and the assistant secretary of the association, H. G. Stern '06, writes that there are now in Seattle and the immediate vicinity about 125 Cornellians, with more coming every week. Albert H. Beebe '01 is the president of the association. The directory gives the telephone number as well as the street number of each member.

More than forty Cornell men met in Seattle on July 2, the day of the intercollegiate regatta, and had a "feed" to celebrate Cornell's clean sweep. Owing to the difference in time between Seattle and New York they knew the result at five o'clock in the afternoon.

## THE FOOTBALL OUTLOOK.

### Heavy Loss by Graduation—Large Coaching Staff to Be On Hand.

Football practice will begin at Percy Field on Monday, September 20, and the first game will be played on October 2.

A greater effort than ever before has been made by the Field Committee to provide for the presence during the season of a numerous staff of graduate coaches. It is hoped and expected to have Daniel A. Reed '98 at Percy Field throughout the season. He may not be able to spend the entire eight weeks of the season in Ithaca, but it is virtually certain that he will give the team the benefit of his coaching for a considerable period. Reed was one of the strongest of Cornell guards and he has been one of the most effective of Cornell's line coaches since his graduation. The permanent coaching staff this season will include P. E. Larkin, G. H. Walder and B. J. O'Rourke. Larkin will, as last year, give special instruction to the ends. Walder, captain of last year's eleven and All-American fullback, will have charge of the backs. O'Rourke, with his experience at tackle, will round out the staff.

The Field Committee has aimed to time the visits of the various graduate coaches so that there will be a number on hand before each game. In its work it has had the active assistance of the graduate manager of athletics, who gives out the following list of the men who are to return. This list is subject to revision, as some of the men named in it are not certain that they will be able to visit Ithaca at the period indicated, and doubtless there will be coaches present who have not yet been heard from definitely.

The team has suffered a heavy loss by graduation. Among last year's players who are on the retired list are Captain G. H. Walder, fullback; B. J. O'Rourke, tackle; J. J. Cosgrove, guard; C. Wight, center; A. H. Hutchinson, G. K. Shearer and H. G. Mowe, halfbacks; R. K. Caldwell and F. E. Gardner, quarterbacks; J. G. McCollum, tackle, and E. I. Bayer, end.

The following are expected to return: R. B. Hurlburt, E. S. Crosby and E. G. MacArthur, ends; F. W. Bell, guard; B. B. Wood, quarterback; R. L. Leventry, tackle, and Captain A. F. Tydeman, halfback. Captain Walder's place at fullback will be hard to fill. A likely candidate, however, is Clarence J. Pope, who was Walder's understudy last year.

There were several men who showed up unusually well on last year's freshman team, including Weeks and Donnan, tackles, Baker, quarterback, and Teagle, end. There are several others who may develop into first class material. Besides the freshmen, the new candidates include Taylor, a halfback, and Stude,

a tackle, who are known to be good players but who were ineligible last year. Captain Tydeman writes: "The general outlook is at present bright although most of last year's team was lost through graduation. A large and efficient corps of coaches will be on hand this year, and with the material we have we should certainly make a good showing, at least."

The schedule this season bears little resemblance to that of last year. There will be nine games, and five of them will be with teams that were not met last year. The newcomers are Harvard, the "Troy Tech," Fordham, Williams and Niagara. The most important addition to the schedule is the Harvard game, to be played in Cambridge on November 6. A week later will come the Chicago contest, to be played in Ithaca in return for the game played in Chicago last fall. With three big games coming within the space of twenty days, the coaches and players have their work cut out for them.

#### Extensive improvements at Percy Field.

When the members of the football squad return to Percy Field next month they will find that numerous improvements have been made at the field during the summer. About \$3,000 is being expended by the Athletic Association, chiefly in installing a new heating plant and new plumbing in the clubhouse. For the heating plant a one-story addition has been built on the north side. The entire clubhouse has been thoroughly cleaned and renovated. The steel grandstand has been moved into position on the north side of the gridiron and painted. The big freshman bleacher west of the covered stand has been cut down by five tiers of seats and reinforced.

## OBITUARY.

C. E. WASHBURN.

Judge Charles Everett Washburn, of Boston, a graduate of Cornell of the class of '76, died at his home in Wellesley, Mass., on August 16 from the effects of a pistol wound, self-inflicted. Three years ago his eldest son was drowned while skating at Lake Waban. Judge Washburn was fifty-eight years old and had lived in Wellesley about thirty years. He had always taken a prominent part in town affairs and drew up the original by-laws of the town. For many years he was trial justice at Wellesley. He had been principal of the Needham, Wrentham and Wellesley high schools.

DR. M. S. PURDY.

Dr. Markwell Seward Purdy, a member of the class of 1882, died on July 25 at his home, 308 North Tioga street, Ithaca. He had been ill for several months with a complication of diseases. Dr. Purdy was born in Bradford, N. Y., the son of Dr. William S. Purdy, and he was fifty years old at the time of his death. He was prepared for college at a school in Illinois, and entered the science course at Cornell in 1878, graduating four years later. For many years he conducted the Highland Pines Sanitarium at Corning, N. Y., and about a year ago he removed with his family to Ithaca. Until failing health compelled him to resign he was the secretary of the class of 1882. Dr. Purdy was married in 1893 to Miss Catherine D. MacLean, of Lawrenceville, Pa., who survives him, with four children.

F. B. DOUDNA.

Frank B. Doudna, who was in 1890 a student in the law school, died on October 21, 1908, at Quaker City, Ohio. He was engaged in the practice of law there.

PETER WINTERMUTE.

Peter Wintermute died in New York city on June 26 of pneumonia. He was born in Horseheads, N. Y., twenty-seven years ago and was prepared for college at the Elmira Academy. He entered Cornell in

1890 and graduated with the degree of M. E. in 1895. He was in the engineering profession at the time of his death.

J. L. DE VARONA.

Joseph Leo de Varona, a graduate of the Medical College of the class of 1905, practicing medicine at 109 Reid avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., died in Brooklyn on May 29 last.

PAULINE LANDES.

Pauline Newell Landes, a member of the senior class in the Cornell University Medical College, died of acute leukemia in the Presbyterian Hospital, New York city, on August 16. She was the daughter of a missionary in Brazil and was prepared for college at Northfield Seminary, entering the medical college at Ithaca in 1906.

#### An English Medical Opinion on College Athletics.

At the recent meeting at Belfast, Ireland, of the British Medical Association in the Medicine Section, an interesting discussion arose on the paper on "Athleticism." The Provost of Trinity College, Dublin, Dr. Traill, as a tutor for thirty-two years, during which time 900 young men had passed through his hands, spoke of the moral aspect of athletics. The physical and mental effect was to banish morbid desire.

Sir John Barr, Liverpool, observed that it was the duty of medical men by precept and example to instill into the young men of the nation a love of athletics. The more hazardous the game the better for the development of the character and the individual, consequently the more vigorous games were to be commended. No serious accident was likely to attend the games now practiced in England. Training should commence at home and in the elementary schools, but first it was necessary to educate the teachers and draw them from a superior class of men.

**PERCY FIELD.**

It is several years now since any great amount of money was expended in the maintenance of Percy Field. Only the most necessary repairs have been made. The clubhouse and equipment have become dilapidated, but the Athletic Council has hesitated to authorize extensive repairs because of the hope that the new field on the hill would be ready before long. Several thousand dollars was spent two years ago for a steel grandstand, but the stand was built in sections so that it can be taken down and moved to the new field

whenever the time comes. It was not in the nature of a permanent improvement at Percy Field. Now, however, the Athletic Council has authorized the graduate manager to spend about \$3,000 in permanent improvements at Percy Field during the present vacation. This is a change of policy. It indicates that the Council has adopted a doubtful in place of a hopeful attitude toward the Alumni Field project. The Athletic Association has been waiting so long now for Alumni Field that it is compelled at last to treat Percy Field once more as a permanent investment and to make permanent repairs in the decaying equipment there. The \$3,000 that these repairs will cost would help materially toward the \$100,000 equipment fund that the Alumni Field committee is raising, but the Association cannot put off extensive repairs any longer. The old clubhouse had become unsanitary and unhealthful. It should be borne in mind that no amount of money will ever make Percy Field a satisfactory athletic plant. The need of a new field is more imperative every year.

**AND NOW A SECRETARY.**

With the appointment of nine additional members from earlier classes, bringing its membership up to fifty, the Cornellian Council's organization is now complete with one essential exception—the selection of a permanent secretary. A committee of the Council has been searching for the right man for this place for several months past but has not yet announced a selection. The office will be an important one, as practically all the work of soliciting contributions of money from alumni for university purposes—the work for which the Council was established—will fall upon the secretary.

**Assistant to Graduate Manager.**

The Athletic Council has recently created the office of assistant to the graduate manager of athletics, and John H. Scott '09, of Pittsburg, has been appointed to the position for next year. He was the manager of the 'varsity baseball team last year. He is a member of the Kappa Sigma fraternity and of Quill and Dagger.

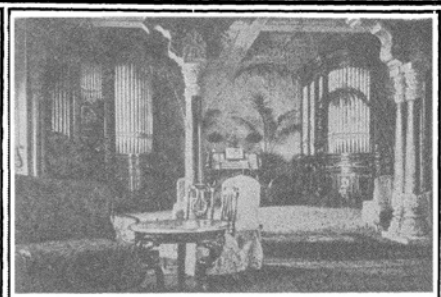

Straight '01, the representative of the American bankers who are seeking to participate in the Chinese loan. Mr. Straight is on his way to the Far East.

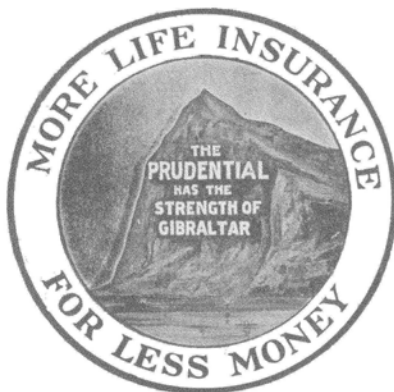

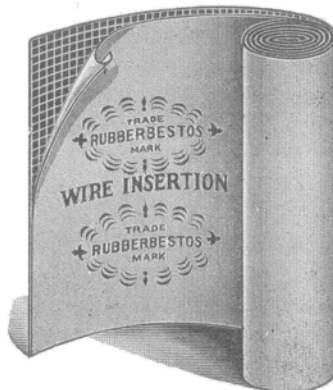
