The New C. E. Director

His Work as a Government Engineer on the Lake Survey

Eugene E. Haskell, director of the College of Civil Engineering, arrived in Ithaca last week to assume his new duties and form plans for the year's work at Lincoln hall. Mr. Haskell has recently been honored by President Roosevelt with an appointment on the International Waterways commission.


Mr. Haskell is a graduate of Cornell and an engineer of varied experience and established reputation. He received the degree of B. C. E. in 1879 and C. E. in 1890. Immediately after receiving his first degree he obtained employment with the United States Lake Survey, located at Detroit, and prosecuted a survey of the Great Lakes for the purpose of charting these waters for the navigator. He spent the remainder of the year as an assistant to Dr. R. S. Woodward, now president of the Carnegie Institution, on field astronomical and trigonometric work. He spent the greater part of the year 1880 as an assistant on railroad construction in what was then Dakota.

Toward the close of 1880 he reentered the service of the government and spent the next five years with the Mississippi River commission, with headquarters at St. Louis, on surveys and hydraulic investigations of the Mississippi river. During this time he received several promotions and rose to the position of assistant engineer in direct charge of field work. It was during his experience in hydraulic investigations of the Mississippi that he formulated the ideas for the current-meter which bears his name and which is now extensively used in measuring the flow of water in open channels, by the government, by cities and by water power companies.

In 1885 he was selected by the late Henry Mitchell, assistant U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, Washington,

D. C., for an hydraulic investigation of the waters of New York harbor. This investigation covered nearly three years and the results of it are to be found in the reports of the Coast and Geodetic Survey for the years 1886 and 1887.

Mr. Haskell remained with the Coast and Geodetic Survey nearly eight years. He was made a full assistant in the survey in 1890 by Dr. T. C. Mendenhall, then superintendent. In addition to the above work he was on investigations relating to the

erosion of the coast of Massachusetts by the sea, the pollution of the waters of Long Island sound by sewage from cities and towns on its watershed, and currents and temperatures of the Gulf Stream off the eastern coast of Florida and in the Gulf of Mexico.

DIRECTS LAKE SURVEY

In 1893 the late General O. M. Poe secured his services for the reorganization of the U. S. Lake Survey for the purpose of carrying out exten-

Large Summer School

Sixteen Foreign Nations and 41 States Represented in the Attendance

The most successful session in the history of the Cornell summer school came to a close on August 15. The session was notable in several ways, not only for larger attendance than ever before, but for the efforts made to provide entertainment, social and intellectual, for the students outside of regular class work. The lectures were more numerous than in previous years, and included many important addresses by men eminent in their fields. Organ recitals, evening readings by Professor Corson and Sabbath services in the Chapel, all contributed to the interest and success of the work.

Another significant fact is that this year's session contained a higher percentage of teachers than ever before. This is brought out by the following table, showing the attendance for each year since 1900:

The cosmopolitanism of Cornell University, previously noted in these columns, was well illustrated in the summer school. Sixteen foreign countries and 41 states and territories were represented in this year's attendance. The native registration was 582, including 11 from the Philippines, and the foreign registration 50. Of the states, New York led with 288 students, while Argentine Republic, with 14, and China with 12, were far in advance among the foreign nations. Canada sent 4, Brazil and India 3 each, Holland, Cuba, Japan and Mexico 2 each, while Panama, Nicaragua, Peru, Chili, Ecuador and Russian Poland contributed one student each.

During the summer the scientific classes made weekly excursions to points of scientific interest around Itha-

ca. The opportunities offered by the region to the botanist, geologist and other investigators were freely made use of. Enfield Falls, Taughannock, the Cayuga lake shore and other interesting places were visited by Saturday excursion parties which were one of the most pleasant features of the summer work.

New Drill Ground Ready

The military department of the University, encouraged by the success attained last year and by the evident increase in popularity among the "Student Body," is making plans this year for more extensive operations than ever before. The most important developments will be the opening of the new drill ground, and the increase in registration owing to the return to the old rule requiring military drill of Sophomores as well as Freshmen.

The new ground has been in course of preparation for two years past, and is now finished and ready for use. The old gully between the Armory and Sage College—crossed in the early days of the University by a rude plank bridge—has been filled in with hundreds of loads of dirt from the Goldwin Smith and Rockefeller hall excavations and from many other sources, until the field is entirely smooth, with a gentle slope to the westward. The result is a decided improvement in the appearance of this portion of the Campus, as well as an increase in the area of drill ground available for Captain Barton and his troops.

A welcome innovation of the new regime is the discarding of the old pattern Springfield rifles, which have been used by the cadets for generations back. All the old guns were packed in twenty big boxes a few weeks ago, and shipped back to Springfield, Mass. When the University opens this fall the men will be furnished with new Krag-Jørgensens, the same as are used in the regular army.

An opening reception was held in Goldwin Smith hall August 8 for the summer school students. The building was lighted from top to bottom and between two and three hundred persons were present. The Filipino orchestra furnished music for the occasion.

Improvement of Gorge

Dr. Schenck Visits Ithaca and Arranges for Carrying out of Plans

Herbert D. Schenck, '82, president of the Brooklyn Alumni association, came to Ithaca a few days ago to perfect arrangements for the improvement of Fall creek gorge, which has been undertaken under the auspices of the Brooklyn alumni. Dr. Schenck reports that arrangements have been made with Franklin C. Cornell, who owns the gorge, for the construction of the necessary paths and bridges, and that work will be commenced this fall on the plans drawn by Professor W. W. Rowlee. The estimated cost of the improvements will be \$5,000.

The work which will be done will be much more extensive than has been generally understood. It is the purpose of the alumni to restore the gorge as nearly as possible to a state of nature. To this end all wooden and iron stairways and railed-off view points will be done away with. The construction will be almost entirely of earth pathways at a gentle incline among the trees, giving an outlook over the lake, the city and the hills to the west and south.

The outline of the work contains three bridges. There will be paths on the north side of the gorge both from Central avenue at the rear of the road between Sibley College and Franklin Hall, and from the extension of East avenue, where it joins the Forest Home road.

These paths will wind along the south and north sides of the gorge. They will join in a bridge which will convey the path on the north side over to the south to avoid the heavy cliff overhanging the gorge near Forest falls, the site of the old burned out power house which the committee hopes to have cleared away. An ideal natural lookout will be situated on the plateau of rock at this point.

From the plateau the path will cross under the street railway bridge at Stewart avenue on the south side of the gorge eight feet above the water to the brink of Ithaca falls, where a third the north side again. Thence it will follow the full sweep of the natural cove overlooking the falls, the lake and city, descending easily and naturally to swinging foot bridge will convey it to

a point north of the old gate house.

If the work is undertaken promptly the paths will be open and ready for use before the class of 1907 graduates.

Football Schedule

Owing to the new eligibility rules barring first-year men from Varsity teams, the Freshman class will not be available this fall as a source of material for the eleven, and the usual newspaper talk of "prep. school stars" who are headed for the Campus has not been forthcoming.

Cornell Man Selected

Commissioned to Design \$2,000,000 Library Building in Brooklyn

Raymond F. Almirall, B. S. in Arch., '91, has been selected by President Bird S. Coler of Brooklyn to design the new \$2,000,000 Central library building to be erected on the Prospect park plaza, Brooklyn. The library trustees have approved the choice and arranged that Frank P. Hill and Professor A. D. F. Hamlin accompany Mr. Almirall to Europe as a sub-committee and look over the library buildings there. The cost of the trip will be defrayed from a special appropriation of \$25,000 made by the board of estimate to cover the expense of the preliminary plans for the library. President Coler has asked the architect and the sub-committee to act as quickly as possible, in view of the magnitude of the work, which he is anxious to have finished under his administration.

Mr. Almirall, who is placed in charge of this great work, is a resident of Brooklyn, with offices at 50 Chambers street. He served as a member of the Tenement House commission during Governor Roosevelt's administration, and is secretary and member of the advisory committee of architects to the committee in charge of erecting Carnegie libraries in Brooklyn and a member of various art societies. He is a member of many clubs, professional and social. As far back as 1900 he secured a prize at the Paris Exposition. A few weeks ago Mr. Almirall read a paper before the American Library association at Narragansett Pier on "The Design and Construction of Branch Library Buildings."

Of Mr. Almirall's appointment the Brooklyn *Eagle* said:

"Few appointments have given more general satisfaction, or compelled more favorable comment, than the appointment of Raymond F. Almirall, Cornell '91, as architect of the Central library in this city. While not confining to a single sphere the brilliant talents with which nature endowed him, and which an intelligent course of study has served to develop, Mr. Almirall, for the past six years, has made a specialty of the designing of public libraries.

"He is master of the subject not

only from the artistic viewpoint but from the material side as well. As he himself recently said: 'Architecture is not art alone. It is knowledge expressed in art.'

"He is as familiar with the requirements of floor spaces as with the creation of graceful lines and exquisite proportions which render his finished products a delight to the artist's eye.

"A Brooklynite himself, imbued to a high degree with civic pride, a close student of the development of library design, and the architect of some of the most noted buildings in the country, there is no doubt but that the great building which he is to fashion for the splendid site near the Plaza will long live as a monument of model arrangement as well as a masterpiece of architectural design."

Praise for L. A. Fuertes

In an article on the "New Museum Idea" in the *World's Work*, Sherman Langdon speaks of Louis Agassiz Fuertes, B. S. '97, as "probably the most scientific and accurate portrayer of birds now living." Mr. Langdon writes particularly of the Museum of Natural History in New York city and its recent development. He says:

"In the department of ornithology the change in the last few years has been perhaps as striking as in any other. In the old days ill-stuffed bird skins were wired on stiff perches and placed in dusty, unblinking rows behind the glass. Today when you approach Mr. Frank Chapman's wonderful groups at the end of the long hall—it is on tiptoe and with held breath, lest those skipping sandpipers take wing, or that duck just falling among the reeds should turn up against the wind and make out to sea.

"The cases are immense and each is made up to show the birds of a single locality. The backgrounds are landscape paintings which in themselves are delightful pieces of realism and of art.

"Birds are drawn on these backgrounds and painted by Mr. Louis Agassiz Fuertes, probably the most scientific and accurate portrayer of birds now living. Flocks of ducks are seen on the sky line or coming in to drop in the rushes in a way to make the sportsman curse his luck at being without his gun.

"In the foreground the painted sands or rocks or reeds are cunningly joined with the real things or with most accurate reproductions of them; then last of all the specimens are naturally disposed—in such a way as to show the habits of each species. Some of the waders are in the water fishing for minnows, shore birds are running along the sand chased back by the tiny waves, and so perfectly at home that one must look twice to be sure that they are not part of their surroundings.

"The flamingo group is an astonishing piece of color—for a rookery or nesting place of these resplendent birds is shown. The mounted specimens are squatting on their shiny mud nests or stalking over the flats like slender jets of flame.

"Overhead painted on a lovely tropic sky is a large line of birds coming back to their nests from a flight. One man in a million may see the actual thing as Mr. Chapman saw it, but every man may go to Seventy-seventh street, Central Park West, and see as accurate a representation of it as art and science combined may show."

The Courtney Matter

No additional statement has appeared from Coach Courtney since he announced through a reporter in July that he had asked to be released from his contract with the Athletic association. The athletic council, in whose hands the matter rests, will hold its first regular meeting of the college year in October. Having had no session since Mr. Courtney's statement appeared, the council has of course had nothing official to say on the subject. Most of the members have been absent from Ithaca on their vacations. Such of them as could be seen, while declining to be quoted in advance of the council's meeting, indicated that every just concession would be made to Mr. Courtney's wishes, and that no effort would be spared to retain his services. It seems to be the general opinion in Ithaca that Mr. Courtney will decide to remain in charge of the crews.

Athletic Honors for 1906

Cornell's Record Gives Her Paramount Place, says N. Y. Evening Sun

With the closing of the college doors for the summer vacation, the university athlete has laid away his baseball bat, running shoes and sweep, and nothing remains but the echoes of the controversy as to which institution's brawny students won the greatest honors during the season. Undoubtedly the mythical laurel wreath falls to Cornell. The Ithaca athletes swept up victories on land and water this spring in two of the three branches of sport prominent in the closing months of college life.

The progress shown by Cornell in athletics within the last year especially, proves conclusively that the Ithaca university is fast taking a prominent place among the institutions of the East in the field of sports as well as of learning. To win the intercollegiate track meet and the intercollegiate rowing races and to come near the top in baseball, is a record of which the Cornellians may well be proud.

Cornell has for several years enjoyed the position of prominence in the water that Yale enjoys on the gridiron, but until recently her baseball and track teams have not aspired so high. Time was when the Red and White would send a team of six men to the Mott Haven games. Maybe a high jumper or a hammer thrower would score points for his college, but that was about all.

That is why the collegiate world was jolted a bit when Cornell actually carried off the meet in 1905 and then again in 1906. It will be a case of look out for Cornell runners hereafter. The Ithacans are still weak in football, however, but they will undoubtedly improve there too.

The victory of the Cornell crew at Cambridge and again at Poughkeepsie this year gives her undisputed right to the title of premier honors in rowing. The Cornell eight was the flower of the land. Pennsylvania also had a fine eight and probably ranks second, with Harvard or Syracuse third. As far as the Crimson is concerned, the Cambridge crew this year was the best ever turned out at the university on the Charles.

The Cornell baseball nine barely

missed making as good a showing as the other two Ithaca university teams. It lost its most important games by very close margins.

To Princeton must be given the credit of turning out the strongest combination on the diamond. The loss of the final game of the season to Pennsylvania after one defeat of Pennsylvania, and two straight victories over Harvard and Yale was the only thing that marred the brilliant showing of the Orange and Black. But perhaps the Tigers let off some steam after clinching the Harvard and Yale games.

Yale earned the right of second place by virtue of her two triumphs over Harvard and her victory over Cornell. Cornell, which whipped Harvard, comes third and Harvard fourth. Columbia and Pennsylvania are seen somewhere in the vista of the baseball background.

Altogether this has been a most remarkable and successful year for college athletics. The races for the championship in each branch of sport have been well run and hotly contested. Interest has never been allowed to lag, and the teams that won have done so on their merits.—*New York Evening Sun*.

"Jack" Receives Handsome Present

John F. Moakley, trainer of Cornell's Intercollegiate champions on the track, returned to Ithaca last week from Boston, in splendid health and the proud possessor of a magnificent silver set of 125 pieces. The donors included more than a hundred of "Jack's" closest friends, social, professional, political, athletic and personal. Burke, Olympian champion, Arthur Duffey and others.

sive resurveys of the Great Lakes, planned in obedience to acts of the Congress. These surveys are for the purpose of supplying the navigator with sailing charts and of necessity must be accurate. The work is done with all of the refinements known to modern engineering science.

The surface level of all the great lakes fluctuates more or less from natural causes, frequently changing by several feet in the course of a few years. These changes have a marked effect upon the lake commerce, aiding or retarding it to an extent which, measured in money, amounts to many thousands of dollars. For example, a Lake Erie harbor that has a clear channel of twenty feet in 1906, might have but seventeen feet at its entrance two or three years later, owing to a fall in the lake surface of three feet. In consequence a steamer built for a draft of 20 feet, which could carry a full load in 1906, would have to be operated at a great loss in earning capacity on the lower stage of water, while her operating expenses would remain practically the same.

During the year 1895 all of the Great Lakes, with the exception of Superior, had reached the lowest stage of which there is authentic record. The commercial interests saw the necessity for a systematic study of the problem, and appealed to Congress for an investigation of the causes leading to these marked changes in stage, to ascertain if it were not possible to regulate lake levels so that there would be practically the same draft of water in a harbor in November that there was in April, and also the same from year to year.

Congress took action in the matter, and in 1898 assigned to the Lake Survey, in connection with its other duties, the investigation of lake levels. Briefly speaking, this investigation necessitated a study of the rainfall, evaporation, and run-off of the Great Lakes basin, which has an area of approximately 300,000 square miles.

HIS EFFORTS SUCCESSFUL

Mr. Haskell as chief engineer of the Survey was called upon to formulate plans and methods for this investigation. The work has now been in

progress for about eight years, following in detail the course mapped out by him and with marked success in every particular. A systematic study has been made of the rainfall, and of the evaporation that takes place from the lake surfaces. The amount of "run-off," that is, the quantity of water flowing seaward through the outlets of the several lakes is one of great importance. It was necessary to measure with accuracy the quantity of water flowing out through the St. Mary's, St. Clair, Detroit, Niagara and St. Lawrence rivers, and to find the relation between stage of water in the lake and discharge of its outlet—as engineers term it, the determination of the equation or curve of discharge of a stream. This work has been prosecuted with great care and the results indicate that in point of accuracy it is far in the lead of any similar work heretofore attempted. The discharge of the Niagara river, for instance, can be given with an error not greater than two per cent. of the flow. The results of this work up to date are published in the annual reports of the chief of engineers, United States Army, for the years 1900 to 1905.

The methods used in the trigonometric, topographic, and hydrographic work of the survey are almost wholly those proposed by Mr. Haskell. The method of sounding for obtaining depths is by a new process which has made more accurate and rapid work possible. The results of this branch of the work are also to be found in the annual reports of the chief of engineers, United States Army, for the years 1893 to 1905.

Two Works by Cornellians

Two publications by Cornell graduates are announced in the July catalogue of Messrs Longmans, Green & Co. One of these is "The Development of Freedom of the Press in Massachusetts," Vol. XII. of the Harvard Historical Studies, by C. A. Duniway, A. B. '92, associate professor of history in Stanford university. The other is "Plants and Their Ways in South Africa," a profusely illustrated volume by Bertha Stoneman, Ph. B. '94. Miss Stoneman is a teacher in Huguenot College, Wellington, South Africa.

Brief University News

A party of Cornell undergraduates sailed from New York early in June on a summer tour of Europe. They crossed the Atlantic on a cattle ship, working their way, and they travelled thousands of miles on bicycles through England, Germany, Holland, France, Austria, Italy and other Continental countries on bicycles. The expenses of the trip were partly met by corresponding for American newspapers and press associations, and several well-known papers have printed interesting weekly letters telling of the experiences of the young travelers.

Few articles in the current magazines have attracted so much attention from the press of the country as two recent contributions by Director Liberty H. Bailey to the *Century*. In the July number of the *Century*, Professor Bailey gave the results of an interesting summary of the reasons assigned by 155 students for deserting the farm and country to engage in "city occupations." In the August number of the same periodical he disclosed the significant fact that 68 city-bred students of Cornell had expressed to him the definite intention of taking up farming as their life work. Professor Bailey's exposition of the motives that impelled these two counter streams of young men has furnished material for editorial treatment in newspapers all over the United States.

A NEW EDITOR

Tibbetts, who has conducted the paper for two years, resigns to begin the practice of law in New York city. His place will be taken by Woodford Patterson, '95. Mr. Patterson is a newspaper man by choice and training, and has had several years' experience in editorial work on the New York *Evening Sun*. He is an alumnus who has retained his Cornell enthusiasm, and he has kept up his acquaintance with Cornell affairs.

In the selection of a new editor, the Board of Directors has taken a step which it thinks is demanded by the growth of the NEWS, and by the increasing solidarity and influence of the alumni body. The paper will be edited by an experienced man, who is presumed to have acquired the alumni

point of view, and it will have his undivided attention.

That the NEWS will be successful under the new regime is a foregone conclusion to everyone who is acquainted with Mr. Patterson and his work. The retiring editor bespeaks for his successor a continuance of the friendliness and loyal support that have been so freely granted by Cornell alumni during the past two years.

SUMMER SCHOOLS AND "HANG-OVERS"

On every hand are heard pleased comments on the University summer session which recently closed. Both professors and students are enthusiastic over the work done, and the spirit in which it was done. In many ways it was a banner year in the history of the Cornell summer school.

It was not alone the large registration that created this general feeling of satisfaction, though the increase was gratifying as a sign of healthy growth. But it was *quality* rather than *quantity* that enabled the 1906 session to set a new standard for its successors.

The professors tell us—and they are borne out by the registration figures—that teachers were more in evidence in the enrollment this year than ever before. On the other hand, the regular University students, who have been wont to use the summer school as a kind of make-up class for past deficiencies, were conspicuous for their absence. This may have been because the general faculty was more strict this last year and discouraged this habit of falling behind the procession during the college term, and then just managing to crawl up again by more or less faithful work during the hot season. Or it may be that the present undergraduate classes have done better work than past generations of students.

Whatever the cause, the faculty has been heard to remark that the "hang-over" was not much in evidence this year, and that nobody missed him except possibly a few good people who

were afraid the town might lose its real "college" atmosphere during the warm months.

The people who did come to the summer session were mostly hard-working teachers whose only opportunity for advanced work in their chosen fields is in the summer time, when their own pupils are busy with more important things than text books and in more attractive scenes than class-rooms and laboratories. After all, it was for teachers such as these that the summer session, as an institution, was devised. And it is not strange that the officers of the Cornell school were not especially pleased a few years ago when the public seemed to be getting the idea that the summer school was a sort of "extra session" called for the purpose of finishing up a few odds and ends that were not quite disposed of when the regular session adjourned on Commencement day.

For the success of the 1906 summer school the whole faculty is entitled to credit, for all worked together with enthusiasm and singleness of purpose. But there is one man who deserves especial recognition, and that is George P. Bristol, who acted as dean of the school in the absence of Professor De Garmo. Professor Bristol began to lay his plans for the session last winter, and proceeded to carry them out with an energy and enthusiasm that left no doubt of final success. Everyone who realizes the importance of the summer session—and the number is large among Cornellians—will yield a hearty tribute of thanks to this modest man, who always does so well the thing that his hand finds to do.

ALUMNI IN THE FACULTY

Cornell always has a warm welcome for any of her sons who returns to her halls as a member of the staff of instruction. The University is not yet so ancient as to make the holding of deanships and professorships by Cornell men a matter of course. Nobody,

probably, would approve a tendency to give our own graduates such preference merely because they are Cornell men, but just the same it is pleasant to note the increase in the number of one's fellow alumni in the faculty.

There will be two notable additions of this sort this fall—Eugene Elwin Haskell and Thomas Lyttleton Lyon. Professor Lyon is a '91 man and came back to Ithaca for a doctor's degree two years ago. He gives up a professorship of agriculture in the University of Nebraska to take the chair of experimental agronomy in the

federal experiment station. Director Haskell was a pupil of his predecessor, the lamented Professor Fuyertes. Like him, he has made his earlier reputation as a practical engineer rather than as a teacher. The qualities he showed in the lake survey recommend him as an excellent man to direct the college of civil engineering.

Synnot a year ago, and by virtue of this position became a member of the University Board of Trustees. improvement of the City Library in his charge. At the time of his death he contemplated a trip to Europe for the purpose primarily of purchasing books for the library.

He was born in Ithaca November 9, 1858, the son of Ebenezer T. Turner and Mrs. Elizabeth (Williams) Turner. In the University he was a member of the Psi Upsilon fraternity. After his graduation he attended the Columbia Law school with the aim of following the profession, but the large financial interests which devolved upon him at his father's death led to the relinquishment of active professional work. He identified himself closely with the various public and philanthropic organizations of his native city. He was treasurer of the Old Ladies' Home and practically its director, treasurer of the Children's Home and director of the Young Men's Christian association and of the City hospital.

His considerable wealth brought him into association with the leading financial institutions of the city. He was a director of the First National bank and of the Ithaca Trust company, of which he was one of the founders. He was a member of the Town and Gown club, the Ithaca Country club and the University club of New York city.

Of Mr. Turner's character Professor Waterman T. Hewett writes:

"I knew him first thirty-six years ago, a mere lad then. One of his friends said to me: 'I never knew so perfect a character.'

"That character grew in clearness of purpose, in self-direction, and it was never marred by contact with hard and selfish personal interest which often characterizes so much of the dealings of the modern business world. The man, intent upon success, prosecuting vigorously, sometimes ruthlessly, a career of individual interest, might easily fail to recognize the strength of a life deriving its sources from purely ideal purposes.

"Loyal to friendship as few men are, possessing a nature of singular richness, with a native reluctance at self-revelation, he presents a type of character rare in this modern world. Sensitive to all that was good and true in literature, retaining amid his business and professional life communion with the world's greatest thinkers and writers, using large means not for him-

self but to bless others, seeing clearly the approach of death and talking freely of it to those to whom he revealed his confidence, but with unswerving faith, few natures disclose a more symmetrical character. Of all the men whom I have known, to no one does the word blameless more perfectly apply."

In his will, probated August 25, Mr. Turner left the bulk of his estate, estimated at half a million dollars, to his brother, Ebenezer T. Turner, B. C. E., '83. Five thousand dollars was given to the Cornell (City) Library association for the purpose of making such alterations in the library building as may be necessary to increase the efficiency of the building and reading room, and especially to provide proper facilities for consulting books in the library. The will was accompanied by a private memorandum, dictated by Mr. Turner during his last illness, in which he left \$2,500 to the City hospital, \$2,500 to the Old Ladies' Home and \$1,000 to the Children's home.

IRVINE MILLER, '81.

Irvine Miller, '81, died at Springfield, O., on July 22, of Hodgkin's disease. Mr. Miller was a patent lawyer. He was a cousin of Professor Frank Irvine, of the faculty of the College of Law.

CHARLES A. WHEELER, '74

Charles A. Wheeler died at his home in Deposit, N. Y., on July 31, after an illness of several months. He was fifty-six years old. He was the son of the late Addison J. Wheeler and a grandson of the late Hon. Charles Knapp. He was an extensive farmer and prominent in Delaware county politics. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Addison J. Wheeler. Mr. Wheeler was a member of the class of '74 at Cornell and of the Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity.
